County Reverse Decision On Hospital Levy Vote

York County Council last Thursday approved a hospital levy change by a vote of 14 to 13, then reversed its decision and tabled the proposal until its December meeting.

The resolution by Woodbridge Reeve Norm Garriock called for the county to pay Woodbridge's hospital levy of about \$400 to Peel County rather than to the York County hospital system.

The reeve said no one in Woodbridge is a patient in the York County system according to his records and Woodbridge citizens use the services of Peel Memorial Hospital in Brampton.

"Woodbridge supports the system of county hospitals; however the people and doctors of our community are solid about continuing at Peel," the reeve said.

He said the proposal met with the county hospital commission's approval.

Reeve Alma Walker of Markham Village said her community was in the same situation with most of the patients going to Scarborough Hospital.

Reeve Garriock said York Central when it is opened will immediately be filled up to capacity. "By diverting everyone to the new hospital is defeating our own purpose," he said.

Richmond Hill Deputy-reeve S. J. Tinker said it was the first indication of a breakaway from the York County system. "There appears to be an undue burden on Woodbridge but if they pay double, they'll have double service."

Richmond Hill Reeve Floyd Perkins said, "The county should have some arrangement with Peel County to pay a grant such as Simcoe County gives to York County for potential patients in the Bradford area who would come to York hospitals."

Both Richmond Hill members stood opposed to the resolution when a motion to table it was virtually ignored by Warden Clarence Davis and the vote was held . . . a 13 to 13 tie broken by the warden who carried the resolution.

The vote was questioned on the basis of the tabling motion by its mover Reeve Marian Gillan of Sutton and a second vote was held to table it.

Forced Two Cars Off Road, Driver Fined \$150, Costs

Maynard H. King, 30, of Whitby was fined \$150 and costs after Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake Tuesday convicted him of driving while impaired.

Sgt. Bill Mabery, Vaughan Township Police testified he spotted a car driven by King southbound on Yonge Street near Elgin Mills Road at a high rate of speed.

The officer said it failed to stop for a red traffic light at Centre Street and another at Markham Road.

Two other motorists, police said, were forced off the road because of King's erratic driving.

King told court he had gone over 36 hours without sleep and had driven to a point in northern Ontario and back. He admitted drinking two bottles of beer.

Bathurst Project Causes Problems At Patterson P.S.

Although street reconstruction is usually a desirable thing, on Bathurst Street in Vaughan it has caused some problems.

Members of Vaughan School Board expressed their concern for the safety of children at Patterson School north of Maple Sideroad on Bathurst Street which has been lowered and widened in a project this fall.

The slope of the entrance to the school is now steeper and with the increased width of the street more traffic is expected resulting in a traffic hazard for students disembarking from school buses.

Vaughan's Road Committee suggested the slope be cut back further into the property and the 60 foot culvert pipe be installed to permit the school bus to pull off the shoulder when discharging pupils.
