Chm. Sam Cook Reviews Work Of Hydro Comm.

Seeking re-election to the Richmond Hill Hydro-Electric Commission at Monday night's nomination meeting, Chairman Sam Cook reviewed the work of the three member commission during the past year.

Ontario Hydro officials have expressed their pleasure at the satisfactory financial position of the local utility. In a letter to hydro officials the senior body remarked, "we are pleased to note that you continue to enjoy a favourable financial position. The service revenue increased during the year which to a large extent no doubt reflects your load building program. The average monthly consumption per residential customer increased from 326 kilowatt hours in 1961 to 351 kilowatt hours in 1962."

"This marks the third year in a row your commission has not required any debentures," stated Mr. Cook. Any debentures for capital costs are a charge against the credit of the municipality.

The major undertaking during the past year has been the purchase of the Centre Street East substation from Ontario Hydro. The three substations are now owned locally which means a considerable saving in rental charges. The Centre Street substation alone will mean an annual saving of \$8,900 in rental charges.

A member of the commission since its formation in 1957 Mr. Cook has served as chairman since 1958.

of work to be put on the outside staff."

Planning Director Harold Deeks said he was very much in favour of requiring subdividers to maintain or be required to place a tree per lot.

He commented that in the country where there are so many trees "people seem to want open space for good reasons." This isn't the case in the Richmond Hill area where there is plenty of tree-less space, he said.

The board began the discussion by favouring the Etobicoke motion requiring that \$8.80 per tree be charged to the subdivider to provide for planting.

The money would go into a common tree fund.

"I favour the Etobicoke plan," said Director Deeks, "because it specifies either dollars or trees."

Chairman Cecil Williams wondered if there were not already too many conditions being placed on subdividers, with trees being an added burden.

It was finally decided to table the question until opinions of various municipal departments could be secured.

The Etobicoke provision reads: "Existing trees on land to be subdivided not to be removed without township permission. Where no trees exist a contribution of \$8.80 per lot is required of the subdivider toward the provision of trees. These trees are planted only on the road allowance."

Markham Township adopted the Etobicoke policy at one of its recent meetings.
