Sr. Hockey Patter

The Richmond Hill Senior Hockey League is rapidly turning into a two-division race this year. Plenty of wide space is starting to show between the top three teams and the bottom three.

Still battling it out for top spot are Willowdale Rangers and Leaside Larks with 14 points apiece with Newmarket Cubs coming on fast in third spot with 12 points.

From there on in it appears to be a battle for last place with the Richmond Hill Leafs showing no immediate signs of surrendering their dubious claim to the cellar.

Immediately atop are the Thornhill Shamrocks with two points and Downsview with five.

It's the Downsview team that has shown the most life of the threesome but their basketball-like defensive strategies leave a lot to be desired.

In their eight games they've managed to pot 35 goals but have surrendered 52 in return. That's 14 more goals than the lowly Leafs and Shamrocks who have been scored on 38 times apiece.

The Leafs also have the lowest scoring average with 21 goals to their credit, 26 less than the Willowdale Rangers.

Jackie Gilbert of Downsview continues to lead the pack in scoring points on 16 goals and nine assists for 25 points. Holding on to second spot is team mate Rolly Rochon with 18 points on three goals and 15 assists.

Second highest goal-scorer in the league is Thornhill's Gary Stamp with 14.

GAME RESULTS Newmarket Cubs doused any wild ideas the Downsview Flyers might have had in drawing closer to third spot December 15 when they walloped them 9-4 at the Richmond Hill Arena.

It was a 2-2 tie at the end of two periods but the floodgates opened wide in the third as Newmarket poured seven goals past Guy Langois in the Downsview net.

The combination of Dan and Mike Patrick sparked the winners all the way with Dan coming through with three goals and an assist. Mike was close behind with two goals and three assists. Greg Scott scored twice with Charles Leeming, Brian Million each scoring once.

Downsview was again paced by Jack Gilbert and Cam Gauthier with two markers and an assist apiece. Rolly Rochon picked up a couple of assists.

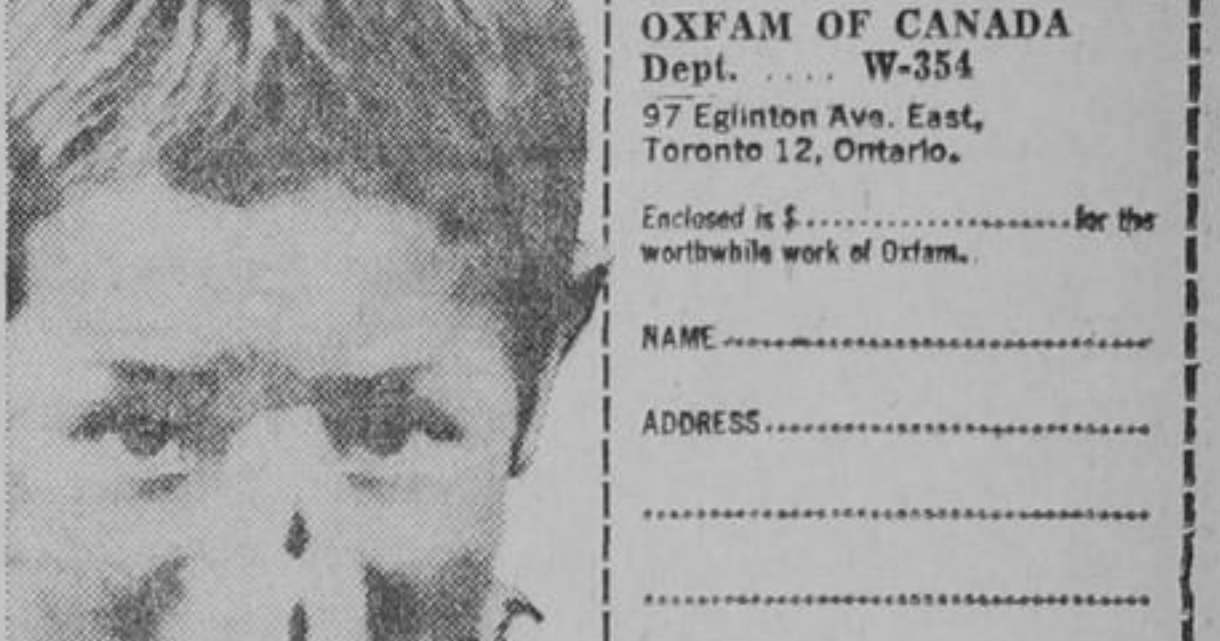

County Welfare Studied

(Continued From Page 1) the aged who didn't necessarily want to enter institutions home-maker and nurses services, nursing home care, some form of collaboration between the variety of services to individuals and families (Miss Touzell said when economic and social problems occur, it usually involves more than one service to solve the problem), counselling and an emphasis on rehabilitation.

It was recommended existing county and local municipal welfare services be administered from one county welfare unit.

The study recommended the following: York Manor: The unit would have the general responsibility for administration including that of secretary to any home committee or board; it should take applications, investigate them and develop a program of home care for those who don't need institutional care but who are eligible.

Hospitalization: Investigate eligibility for hospitalization and develop a group as large as financially sound for pre-payment through the Hospital Services Commission.

Training Schools: Investigate the county's financial responsibility. Children's Aid Ward Costs: Check on responsibility and payment on behalf of the county.

Homemaker and Nurses' Services: Nursing service on a county-wide basis may be either purchased by the proposed welfare unit from the Victorian Order of Nurses or the V. O. N. might extend its area of service (Richmond Hill and Markham) to include the whole county or that the present health unit be expanded to provide the service.

They should be licensed as now on the basis of the health unit and fire protection authority with responsibility for encouraging development of new homes resting with both welfare and health units. Responsibility

should be placed with the welfare unit for certain placements, supervision, financial eligibility investigation and payment.

In her report, Miss Touzell suggested closer liaison with the courts to relate welfare services with the social data required by the court.

"There is a tremendous common interest between courts and social agencies," she said. It would take a staff of about 13 including a director, supervisor, seven field staff, two bookkeepers a secretary and a clerk stenographer to administer the welfare unit, she said.

She suggested the county council should consider the recommendations and be ready to approve a plan by March 31, adopt personnel policies not later than April 30 hire a director by August 1 and be ready to put the plan into operation by January 1, 1965.

A preliminary budget of \$15,000 would have to be approved, she said. Initial projects for the welfare unit would be establishing a home care program for the aged a centralized administration for nursing home functions and a homemaker and nursing service.

To provide the liaison between a welfare unit and county council, Miss Touzell has recommended a 20-member board with 10 county councillors and 10 non-elected persons "known for their competence and interests in social welfare matters."

She also recommended that because of the central and important role of the mental health clinic in all community health and welfare programs and its extension of work when the psychiatric section is opened at the new Newmarket Hospital wing, a study to evaluate its staff and requirements should be made soon.

The county and its municipalities spend about \$174,000 on welfare services of which about \$377,000 of which about \$303,000 is recovered for the province.

Use Of Christmas Trees Dates To Ancient Times

The traditional use of Christmas trees associated with religious festivals, according to most historians, dates back to very ancient times. In North America many credit the introduction of the evergreen tree, as a Christmas symbol, to Hessian soldiers who crossed the Atlantic during the time of the American Revolution.

There has always been a variety of opinion, among experts as to the most important qualities in choosing a tree with needle density of foliage, desirable colour, shape and balance, tradition and other miscellaneous factors such as price, availability and ease of decoration being considered. In some parts of the country fir and spruce are the most popular varieties. In Southern Ontario Scotch pine, a fast growing species with many excellent qualities, now-a-days is the tree most commonly used. In recent years tree growers are paying much more attention to pruning and shaping trees to meet present-day standards and market requirements.

Thousands of trees are already on display at establishments throughout the area for early customers. A word of caution though to those more adventurous individuals who still like to cut their own tree. Remember to respect the rights of the property owner and first obtain permission from him

before doing any cutting. Cutting of trees from private or government land without authority is a punishable offence and penalties involved may do much to mar an otherwise happy Christmas. A word about safety: A dried out tree can be very inflammable and, therefore, be a source of fire risk. Bringing a tree inside, in higher temperatures, will cause it to again resume its transpiration processes which soon use up the moisture in the cells. The life of a tree can be preserved, to some extent, by making a fresh cut in the butt and by keeping it in a pail of water, stored in a cool place until you put it up inside the home. Once erected it is wise to keep the butt immersed in a dish or pan of water, keeping the water level up daily. Some people have also found it beneficial to add a concentrated sugar solution to the water supply. Among other safety precautions, be sure to place the tree as far away as possible from fire or other sources of heating. Also check the wiring carefully to eliminate any faulty electrical connections. Never use candles, which so many times in the past have resulted in costly fires. Lastly, keep tree lights turned off when people are away from the room for any long period of time and before retiring at night.
