R. Boyd were gown'd alike in red taffeta cocktail dresses with matching headresses and bouquets of white carnations with red roses.

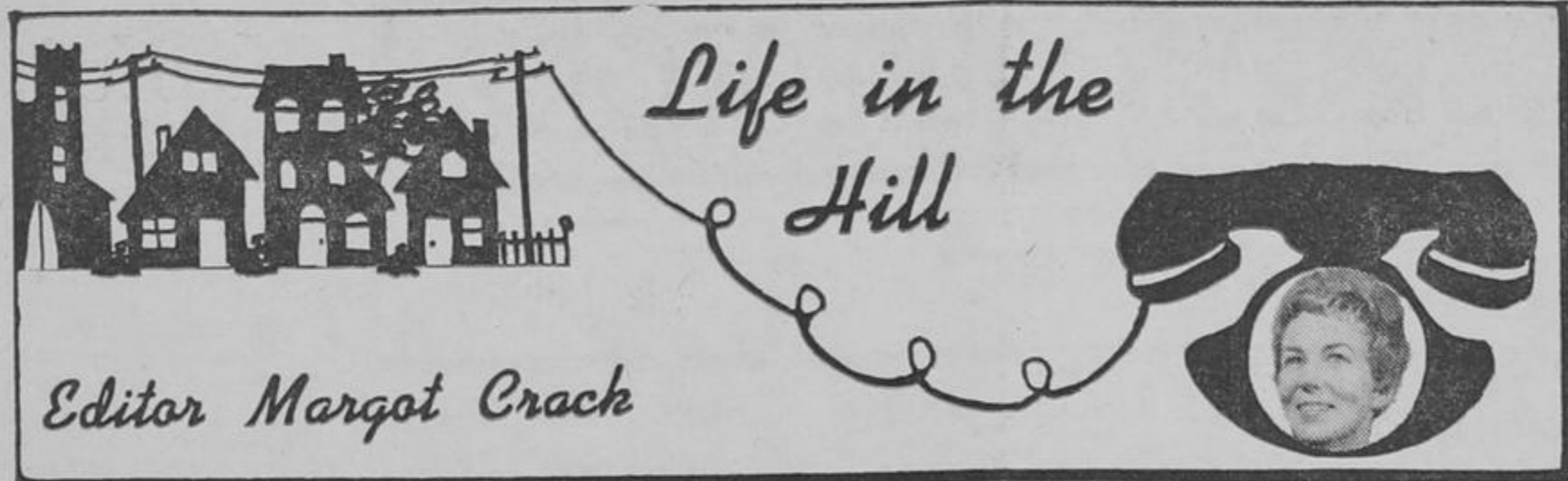
Best man was Mr. Peter Schedlich and ushers Mr. Michael Schedlich, Mr. Trevor Yake and Mr. Michael Leary.
