APPOINTMENT FOR HEARING  
SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT  
& TRIBUTARY SEWERS

construction of sewers, on:
1. **KEELE STREET**, from approximately 500 ft. north of south limit Lot 8 to Langstaff Road, approximate length 3,600 feet.
  2. **NEW STREET (Lot 8)**, from Keele Street to New Street approximately 2,300 ft. east, approximate length 2,300 feet.
  3. **NEW STREET (Lots 7 & 8)**, from South limit of Lot 7 to approximately 500 ft. north of south limit of Lot 8, approximate length 1,900 feet.
  4. **EASEMENT (S. 43 ft. of Lot 7)**, from Keele Street to New Street approximately 2,300 ft. east, approximate length 2,300 feet.
  5. **EASEMENT (Lot 7)**, from New Street approximately 800 ft. west of C.N.R. Newmarket line to Sewage Treatment Plant, approximate length 1,800 feet.

## '63 R.H. Council Refer Business To '64 Council

A Richmond Hill Town Council meeting which lasted little more than an hour Monday evening December 23 wound up the business of 1963's council. Many items of business were referred to the 1964 council for decision and action. Among these were:

A letter from Norman McGibbon making application to have his property taken into the Town of Richmond Hill, and his taxes go to McConaghy Public School. His property is presently in Vaughan Township at the south-west corner of Vaughan Road and Yonge Street. Deputy-reeve Stanley Tinker pointed out that this is not a simple matter since it involves annexation, and "annexation is repugnant to this council."

The Hisey and Barrington engineering services agreement on sanitary sewers.

A letter from E. F. Jackson, owner of 20 acres industrial land. Mr. Jackson is investigating the cost of getting water and other services into his land.

A submission from the hourly rated employees requesting wage adjustments.

**Annexation.** On the subject of annexation Mr. Broadhurst promised to lead a delegation of the whole town council to present "our case bluntly, forcibly and publicly. I would get it out of the realm of back room diplomacy, which has been tried for years; and right where it belongs — in the spotlight of the public forum".

He said he would make no promises on Bayview "he could not keep as the mayor has no vote on county council. Only the reeve and deputy-reeve are the voting members of the county government."

In the matter of capital works projects Mr. Broadhurst said he would set "up an order of priority for them". "The rate at which they were done would have to be limited by the town's ability to pay for them, but certainly a start would have to be made. First priority would go to items designed to eventually increase the value of the town's assessment as this, in turn, would increase our ability to finance the rest of them. Re-development work would fall into this category".

## Police Chief To Buy Books

Richmond Hill Police Chief Robert P. Robbins was authorized by town council December 23 to purchase four copies of any book deemed to be obscene. A recommendation to this effect was contained in the report of the police and fire committee and was implemented by council.

Three copies of such books will be forwarded to the attorney-general's panel on obscene literature for a ruling. The fourth copy will be retained in the police files to be used as evidence if a court case is deemed necessary. A suggestion by Councillor Al White that the fourth copy be turned over to Richmond Hill Public Library if court action is not taken brought the reply from Councillor Alex Campbell.

bell that this would be subject to approval of the chief librarian.

The police and fire committee's recommendation said that in view of the police chief's responsibilities to the "book censorship committee" in pursuance of his duties to that committee, unless he has a court order, he be authorized to purchase four copies from the police budget. It was pointed out that under the Criminal Code the police chief has the power to seize any book considered obscene, but that the purchase would eliminate much undesirable publicity.

Councillor Alex Campbell commented, "The book seller, doesn't mind if he picks up four copies — the rest

will sell like hot cakes."

Recently the police chief borrowed seven copies of Fanny Hill, an eighteenth century English novel, from a local store and submitted it to the advisory panel on obscene literature. Chief Robbins at the time insisted the copies were merely borrowed, not seized. The committee's recommendation concluded "any copies obtained in any other manner (than by purchase) be forthwith returned to the purveyor of such books."

The attorney-general's panel reported they considered Fanny Hill a significant, historic and artistic novel. They did suggest, however, that the book itself might be ruled obscene if made the subject of a court action.

## Police Holiday Accident Scoreboard

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Driver Miss Julia Jarvis, 64, Ross Street, Toronto suffered a broken left wrist while passengers Miss S. Jarvis, 72 suffered a broken nose and lacerations and Mrs. Jean Tweedd, 43, a dislocated shoulder and fractured knee.

The Jarvis car was in collision with a car driven by Ronald Gilli-Ross, Dimplefield Place, Etobicoke, around 1:43 p.m. Damage totalled \$1,000, the chief said. Bad weather was blamed.

Also on Christmas Day, police were called to the scene of an accident on Maple Sideroad and Dufferin Street.

Charged with careless driving was Edward G. Hobbs, 16, 124 Sabrina Drive, Weston following a collision with a car driven by Ross A. Rumble, 19, Richmond Street, Richmond Hill.

Mr. Rumble was cut over the right eye and suffered chest injuries. A passenger, Glen W. Rumble, 10, R.R. 1, King suffered a cut chin and lost some teeth, police said.

Damage to both cars was about \$1,000.

Vaughan Police are also looking for a needle in a haystack after a hit and run accident Boxing Day on County Road 7 north of Steeles Avenue when a car driven by Sylvester Burbacher, Stanhope Road, Toronto was struck by a car which fled from the scene.

## One In Hospital Yonge St. Crash

One driver is in York Central Hospital with undetermined injuries following an accident December 23 at Yonge Street and Trayborn Road.

Taken to hospital was Russell Gray, 42, of Elgin Mills after his car was involved with two others driven by David Rimmer, 21, of Richmond Hill and Edgar Eaton, 51, of Maple around 6 p.m.

Damage was about \$500, Richmond Hill Police said. They are investigating the case; no charges have been laid.

## Three In Hospital After New Year's Eve Accident

Three people were sent to hospital early New Year's Day following a three car crash on Keele Street north of Highway 7, Vaughan Police said today.

Suffering a severe concussion and lacerations were Patricia Waugh, 21, passenger in a car driven by William Waugh, 23, of Keele Street, Toronto, who also suffered lacerations and Kenneth S. Farrows, 18, Rockport Crescent, Richmond Hill who suffered bruises and lacerations.

The Farrows and Waugh cars were in collision with a third driven by Alexander Chree, Plews Road, at 2:45 a.m. Damage totalled \$2,000. Police are investigating.

On New Year's Eve about 5:15 p.m. on the 12th Concession and Highway 49, two cars driven by Charles Houghton, 54, of Cookville and Byron M. Hales, 18, of Bolton were involved in an accident. Damage was \$1,000.

**Bad Weather**  
On January 1 around 4:45 p.m. bad weather was blamed for an accident on Maple Sideroad and Bathurst Street when cars driven by Richard Helleman of R.R. 1, King and Lor-

raine Bone, 24, Keele Street, South Maple were in collision. There were no injuries.

Rosalie Kemp, 25, 6 Gosling Road, Maple was injured in an accident January 2 at 7:15 a.m. when cars driven by Murdo Kemp, 30, also of Gosling Road and John Eluk, 46, of Toronto were in collision on Keele Street, one quarter of a mile north of Highway 7.

Vaughan Chief James Davidson said about 30 cars were checked New Year's Eve and several motorists had to be helped out of ditches.

## More Money Cty.

**Rds., MacNaughton**  
Highways Minister Charles MacNaughton has urged York County Council to speed up its road building program in 1964.

In a meeting with the warden commissioners, finance committee and special roads committee held at the highways administrative offices in Downsview at the end of December Mr. MacNaughton said York is lagging behind in its county road system.

He suggested county council vote more money in the new year for the acquisition and development of additional roads. Last year York spent approximately three mills on roads while the minister said some other Ontario counties are spending as high as seven or eight mills on roads.

He suggested Steeles Avenue, Bathurst Street and Dufferin Street be taken into the county roads system. Mr. MacNaughton said the county should not forget the roads in the northern part of the county.

## Car Clubs Take 65 Drivers Home New Year's Eve

The two Richmond Hill area car clubs acting as a chauffeur service New Year's Eve took about 65 motorists home from parties.

Twenty-eight members of the Aristocrats and Knights Car Clubs began their taxi service at 7 p.m. and the last driver took the last party-goers home at 7 a.m. Wednesday.

It was a free service with drivers supplying their own cars and gasoline. Local taxi-cab companies didn't suffer from the competition as dispatchers were flooded with calls.

Fred Urben, Aristocrats' president and Douglas Cutler, president of the Knights club said the project was part of a public service program launched by Toronto's hot rod hobbyists.

The Aristocrats also collected and mended Christmas toys and operated a Department of Transport vehicle check this past fall.
