

**Brown's Corners Church Annual Meeting**

**Funds And Facilities Are Doubled**

In 1963, Brown's Corners United Church completed its most successful year to date. Six active youth groups, two groups of United Church Women, four catering groups, a junior and senior choir, a Bible study group and active stewards and elders now comprise the church. A large vacation bible school was held in conjunction with Victoria Square and

Headford churches. More than \$17,000 was raised from all sources by a total membership of 86 families of 201 people (32 of which are non-resident). Of this amount, \$11,895 was for local church expenses, the building fund and Toronto and Home Missions work. The church building debt was reduced by \$5,700 during the year down to \$15,000. M and M funds were \$1,805. Funds raised by the UCW totalled more than \$3,000 and envelope offerings for York Presbytery allocations amounted to nearly \$450; \$420 was requested.

Comparing this resume with the 1959 report before the extension was built, membership was much the same (196 members, 42 inactive) but the treasurer's report which in 1963 showed \$11,895, in 1959 was about \$4,378. There was one women's group with receipts of \$816 and allocation funds of approximately \$350; CGIT and Explorers groups were held in conjunction with Headford and Victoria Square; there were no boys' groups, no junior choir.

At the annual meeting held in the church January 27, dessert and coffee were served following which Dr. A.F. Binnington conducted the business of the evening; Hank Coleman acted as secretary.

Donald Reesor, chairman of stewards, paid tribute to Mr. and Mrs. George Clarke who have served as church caretakers for 17 years and recently resigned; Mrs. Clarke is in ill health and Mr. Clarke has reached 79.
