## Harvest Home Service At Pioneer Village

Rev. A. McLean, who has been minister of Willowdale Presbyterian Church for the past 28 years, will conduct the 19th century harvest home services to be held on October 4, at Black Creek Pioneer Village. One service will be held at 1.30 p.m. and the other at 3 p.m.

Rev. and Mrs. McLean are the parents of Mrs. Bruce Snider and Mrs. Campbell Snider of R.R. 1, Maple.

The church will be decorated in the harvest-time tradition, and after each service, the Bolton Community Choir, under Mrs. Dorothy Addison, will sing old-time hymns under the church.

The public is invited to attend the services.

The term "harvest home" derives from the British Isles traditions — the older terms "harvest service" and "harvest sermon" were in use throughout the 19th century.

Ancient Celtic and Saxon rituals combined to give us the time of summer or autumn merrymaking known as "harvest home".

Pennsylvania farmers of Luther and Reformed churches gave the American adaptation of these old traditions, and in the early 19th century, the dialect term "Aernkarich" meaning "harvest home service" is recorded. This was a summer or early autumn festival in celebration of God's goodness to them at harvest time. Still celebrated, it has been borrowed by the Mennonites, Methodists and other church groups.

The tradition was brought to Canada by the Pennsylvania German settlers in the years prior to Confederation.

In the early days the festival was held during the week with a religious service first, followed by feasting at tables laden with the fruits of the land, "making the glad hearts as full as the well-stored barns."

Harvest has been a season for rejoicing from the remotest ages. The Romans had their Cerealia or feasts in honor of Ceres. The ancient Druids of Britain celebrated their harvest November 1. In pre-Reformation England, Lammas day (August 1) was observed as the beginning of the harvest.

Throughout the world, harvest has always been the occasion for many customs — all of which have had their origin in the animistic belief in the "corn spirit" or "corn mother."

In Northumberland, England, an image formed of a wheat sheaf and dressed in a white frock and colored ribbons is hoisted on a pole. This is the "Kern-baby" or "harvest queen" and is set up in a prominent place during the harvest supper.

## Health Unit Says No Request Made

Dr. W. E. Henry, York County M.O.H., his assistant Dr. R. C. Wade and William Burns of the inspection staff of the York County Health Unit visited "The Liberal" office Wednesday afternoon of last week.

Purpose of their visit was to protest a portion of a report of September's meeting of Vaughan Township School Area Board, giving reasons for delay in completing the new Joseph A. Gibson School in Maple. The story which appeared on the Maple page of the issue of September 17, quoted A. Kyle, head custodian, as saying the biggest delay was in getting the septic tank and tile bed inspected by the York County Health Unit.

The men from the health unit claimed that installation of the disposal system had not been made according to approved plans, and until the septic tank and tile bed conform to the approved plans, approval can not be made by the health unit. They also told "The Liberal" that no request for an inspection had been made.
