Recently the Matthews herd broke an all-time Canadian record in production, the sixth all-time record the Matthews herd has established.

During September, they received 15 medal certificates for production on one of the herds Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph is testing.

Mr. Matthews has recently installed a new pipeline machine which takes the milk directly from the cow to the cooler.

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### Not Enough Men To Check County Health Situation

York County sanitary inspectors agree with a Toronto consultant enough time and man hours aren't spent in regular checks of restaurants, dairies, food stores, etc.

At the silver anniversary conference of the Canadian Institute of Public Health Inspectors last week, Kenneth Spencer, a sanitation consultant said inspectors on some Toronto premises were just not up to snuff. He blamed the situation on shortage of staff.

The county which employs about 9 men for inspection, two of them strictly on food outlets, reported a notable increase in its look at the public health for first eight months of this year.

"But we still can't get around to all the places we should," one health department official said.

York County's inspectors, for example, don't check on barber shops, beauty salons or food outlets because of the shortage of staff.

Very few places are closed down because of unsanitary conditions, however, since the health department's policy is to give ample warning to the restaurant owner, for example, that things need changing immediately.

"Most of them co-operate right away but there are some borderline situations," the official said.

**Markham Chief White Undergoes Surgery**  
Markham Village Police Chief Fred White underwent an operation for stomach ulcers at Sunnybrook Hospital last week.

Mr. White advised the press that the operation was successful but her husband will be in the hospital for two or three weeks.

**Stricken At Wheel Bashes Parked Cars**  
A car went out of control on Yonge Street North last Friday night, swiped a guard rail and a hydrant and finally smashed into two parked cars before it stopped.

According to Richmond Hill Police, Leory Theede, 27, of Trench Street, apparently became ill at the wheel of his car before it spun out of control with the resultant damage of about \$900 on the W & P Service Station lot.

Mr. Theede was taken to York Central Hospital with multiple facial and hand cuts but was not seriously hurt, police said.

The accident which occurred about 8:45 p.m. is being investigated.

Earlier Friday, around 5 p.m. there was a two-car rear end collision on Crosby Avenue involving cars driven by Barbara Collier, Elmwood Avenue and Alan Brown, Lynett Cres. There were no injuries and damage totalled \$200.
