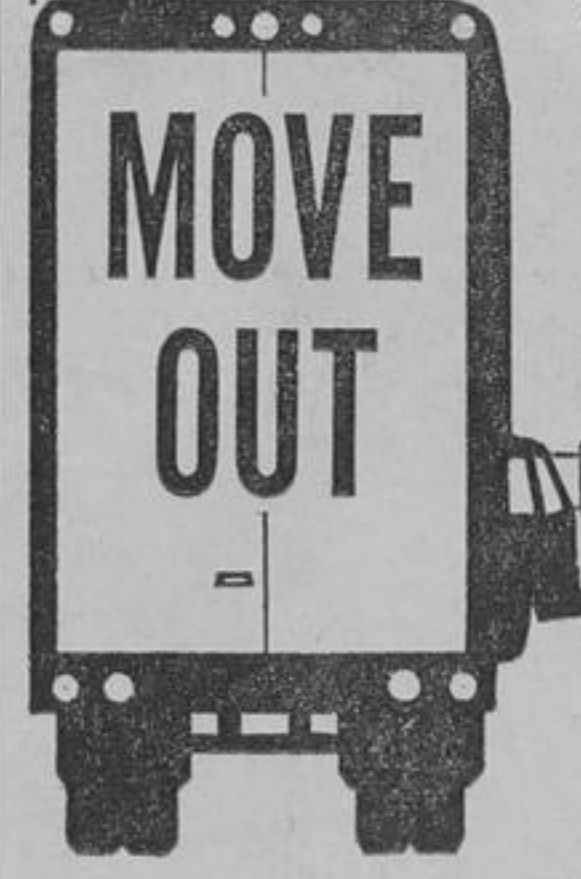
Attend Church Service
