Bunny wanted more education as she had only a grade 11 standing. She was influenced in her decision by Ruth Bell, who at that time was attending the Ontario Teachers' College. Mrs. Bell is now a teacher at Thornhill Secondary School. Knowing of Bunny's ambition, she said, "Well, what's stopping you from going back?" It was a challenge that Bunny couldn't forget. After a family conference, it was decided that if Bunny went back to school and in time got her teacher's certificate, it would provide a form of insurance for the family if anything should happen to the breadwinner. Another reason was that teaching would be the one profession which would allow her to spend more time with her children.

So the family made it a project to send the wife and mother back to school. The children made cookies and sewed on their own buttons. Everybody pitched in with the housecleaning on the weekends. Bunny admits frankly that there are some things that do not get done every day. Dusting for example is not considered as important as the washing and ironing for the family.

Bunny studies at every opportunity, keeps up her active church work two nights a week, manages her home and goes to school every day.

"Before I went back to school," said Bunny, "the children really didn't think I was as much of an authority as their teacher, but now they bring questions to me because they are sure I can answer them. I can't always, but we look things up together." Bunny says the educational standards of the entire family are raised and the children are doing better in school. The Stoneman family is justifiably proud of their scholarship winning mother.

Bunny says that her greatest joy comes from feeling intellectually alive. She has a better grasp of subjects whether it is preparing an essay or a Sunday school lesson. She has learned the value of a minute. "I feel that it is a crime to waste time on trivial things now," she said.

Bunny is very impressed with York and the fact that she will receive her education in a university that believes that the sciences and the humanities together should at least, in the first year, provide a broad base of education. If all goes well, Bunny Stoneman expects to major in history and English.

2. While there has been a slight increase in cost of living index, the value received in a dollar's worth of goods today — is far greater than the value received five years ago.

3. That in any major settlement between labor and management in Canada as we have witnessed recently in the United States, guide posts are established by the government to protect the national competitive position of the country. This was evident in the settlements agreed to by the UAW and the automobile manufacturers in Detroit. The establishment of a minimum wage of \$1.25 across the country, will I am sure, bring about more unanimity between the living standards of the provinces in Canada.

Last week in Ottawa, the name of Hal Banks once again appeared before the House. When we were elected as the government in 1963, terror and violence raged rampant on the Great Lakes. Hal Banks as president of the SIU during this period, had imposed on the Canadian seaman — a dictatorship. This carried on for six years under the Conservative administration and no action was taken against Mr. Banks to stop his ruthless action. The present Liberal government took a stand and 2,000 seamen marched to Ottawa. Mr. Banks was disposed as president of the SIU and a public trusteeship was established by Parliament, justice and peace returned to the Great Lakes and the largest harvest of wheat in our history was delivered.

Mr. Banks was arrested and convicted. He was released on bail and fled the country. My point is this, we have corrected a very unpleasant situation and it is highly unlikely that Mr. Banks will ever return to Canada; if he does, he will be imprisoned. The trustees have discharged their difficult task in a most creditable manner and while everyone may not agree, I believe that the Pearson Government acted in a forthright and courageous manner.
