Recipe of the Month
By the Ontario Tender Fruit Institute
"Buy Canada Choice Canned Fruit"

Peach Jelly Roll
1 can Canada Choice Peaches
1 pkg. lemon-flavoured gelatine dessert

Make gelatine dessert using only one half the water called for in package directions. Drain juice from peaches and store away in refrigerator for use in fruit drinks, salad dressings, frappes.
Pour lemon gelatine mixture into can to replace juice. Stir very gently to distribute peaches evenly to top of can. Place in refrigerator to set.
To serve, unroll onto crisp lettuce leaves and garnish with maraschino cherries and mayonnaise for a shimmering party-style salad.
Or, for dessert, simply spoon out of can into individual dessert glasses and top with whipped cream and a maraschino cherry.
