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21 Per Acre Higher Density Allowed In North Thornhill Area

Revisions to an amendment to Markham Township's official plan were presented to Monday's council meeting by John Bousfield of Proctor, Redfern, Bousfield & Bacon, consulting engineers.

The amendment, previously approved by council, deals with the new residential development north of Thornhill. Bounded by Yonge Street on the west, Bayview on the east, Holy Cross Cemetery on the north and the Don River on the south, the development is divided into three neighbourhoods.

The neighbourhood known as North Thornhill No. 1 extends from Yonge Street to Bayview south of an east-west collector road which divides the whole development almost in half.

The north half of the development is divided by the CNR right-of-way and the area to the north and east of this is known as Thornlea No. 2, while the land to the west of the right-of-way, bounded by the cemetery on the north and the collector road on the south is known as North Thornhill No. 2.

Each of these neighbourhoods will be served by a public school. A senior public school, expected to have 11 grade 7 and 8 classrooms will serve the three neighbourhoods.

North Thornhill No. 1 is expected to have a 16-classroom school for 530 pupils; North Thornhill No. 2, 15 classrooms for 490 pupils and Thornlea No. 2 will have 13 classrooms for an estimated 440 pupils.

School requirements have been based on a ratio of 3.8 person per household for single and multiple family dwellings, with 8 school age children between kindergarten age and grade 8.

For apartments, the figures used were 2.2 persons per household and 15 school age children between kindergarten and grade 8 level.

Councillor Hoover questioned whether these estimates for the number of school children per household were not too low.

Both the separate school board Area 1 and the conservation authorities had raised objections to the original plan and the revised plan presented to council took care of these objections.

A separate school site had not been shown on the original plan but the revision locates a possible separate elementary school site on Bayview Avenue south of the CNR right of way and north of the collector road.

A new high school is anticipated on Bayview Avenue east of the limit of the new community.

With respect to the number of high rise apartments or "high density" areas, Mr. Bousfield emphasized that the plan showed the maximum high density areas possible but that in the event the market so dictated, the high density areas would be reduced. In no event he said would it be "fair" to increase the high density areas beyond what was shown on the revised plan.

This prompted the query from Councillor Charles Hoover "Are you working for Mr. Friedman or for us?"

Mr. Bousfield conceded that he was working for both parties.

Two abandoned houses, known jointly as the Webb property, will be demolished by order of Vaughan Council.

Council Monday night opened three demolition tenders accepting the lowest one of \$550 from Brantford House Wrecking Company. Other bids were Greenspoon Bros. Ltd. for \$770 and McDonald and Sykes for \$1,490.

The properties, subject of numerous complaints for several years by neighbors are located on Pearson Avenue and Edgar Avenue in Richvale.

Approve Changes In Grade 13 Final Exams

All Ontario grade 13 final examinations in languages will be single three-hour papers next June instead of separate papers on literature and composition as in the past.

Education Minister William Davis announced last week the new rule will apply to English as well as French and other languages. Students who have credit in either the literature or composition sectors of a language and are rewriting the other will be required to pass the new combined exam.

Botany and zoology will remain separate in 1965 but the following year will be combined in a single biology examination.

Car Wrecked Two Injured Saturday Accident

One car was totally wrecked and three were damaged to the tune of \$1,000 following a rear-end collision on Yonge Street South last Saturday.

Knocked unconscious was George Lenneville, 17, of Vaughan Township, one of the drivers, and his passenger, Mrs. Margaret Fortier of Duplex Avenue, Toronto, received a bump on the head.

Other drivers involved were David Pridham, 22, of Islington Donald Bruce Redford, 30, of Toronto and Geraldine Watson, 65, of Toronto. The last three were stopped in the line of traffic when Lenneville's car plowed into them from behind causing the chain reaction.

Richmond Hill Police are investigating and charges are expected.

Markham Village Chief Recovering Case Is Delayed

Markham Village Police Chief Fred White, recuperating from an operation since he came out of hospital last Wednesday was unable to appear in Richmond Hill Magistrate's Court in a driving fatality case.

The chief is a critical witness, according to Crown Counsel Arleigh Armstrong, against James Caldwell, 28, a Markham truck driver charged with dangerous and careless driving following the death in an accident last August of T. Leonard Pinnegar, a Richmond Hill chiropractor.

Several remands on the case have been granted awaiting Mr. White's recovery.

Caldwell's defense counsel violently protested further adjournments since some of the defense witnesses were being put to great inconvenience, he said.

Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake set the date of trial as November 3 and asked Mr. Armstrong to notify the defense if any further date was necessary.
