The more than 1,500 acre ranch property offered for sale by Maj. General and Mrs. Churchill Mann has been sold in part to unnamed buyers for an undisclosed amount.

View Hullos Farms, north of King City and west of Newmarket, was put up for sale in May, 1963.

According to Chambers and Meredith, Toronto real estate brokers who handled the transactions for Mrs. Mann's 1,050 acre farm and an earlier sale of 400 acres of General Mann's property, neither purchasers nor amounts could be revealed.

Last year, the property was reported to have had a \$2,500,000 price tag on it and earlier this year it was offered in parcels with a reported combination price of \$1,650,000.

The farm includes a 14-room bungalow erected on "Joker Hill" about 11 years ago at a cost of more than \$200,000.

Trustees Refute Committee Charge Plans Hasty

Hot on the heels of the first brief mailed to King City residents by opponents of incorporation of the police village, trustees issued from the village office their version of incorporation procedures.

"According to the statement of the three trustees: 'A few days ago, householders in the village received a lengthy document setting out the reasons why seven persons, calling themselves, 'King City Incorporation Opposition Committee' consider incorporation of this very large police village into a village an unwise procedure.

'This committee is composed of men who have never had sufficient interest in village affairs to offer themselves as trustees and who, with the exception of two (one a very recent resident) have been conspicuously absent from all meetings of the trustees at which the problems of the village are discussed and policies

formulated,' trustees charged. They accused trustees of hasty and underhanded action in making application to the Ontario Municipal Board for a hearing on incorporation of the village.

"Note that the application will lead to a hearing, not a decision by the trustees. The board will make the decision as they see fit and in the best interests of the village."

Trustees gave the text of a petition signed by all 10 living trustees, past and present, and presented in 1961 to serving trustees for their action:

"We, the trustees and former trustees of the Police Village of King City hereby request the village trustees of King City for 1961 firstly, to obtain the necessary professional help for the purpose and secondly, to sponsor the necessary petition of ratepayers to the municipal board for incorporation of a suitable area of King City and

vicinity as an incorporated village."

The petition presented to trustees three years ago by a trustee of 1960, Warren McKendry, was headed by signatures of the three trustees then in office—Ronald Bolton, Donald Findlay and Robert O'Reilly—followed by those of Mr. McKendry, Harry Edwards, W. A. Carson, John Dew, Robert McLeod, Alex. Campbell and Mary E. Scott.

Trustees' current statement points out, "The original application was to have been for an area greater than the police village and would have required the signatures of 75 inhabitants.

"The present application is for incorporation of the police village on its present boundaries and requires the signatures of the three trustees only.

"If an application, made more than three years later, following intensive studies by

Ontario's leading engineering, planning, municipal finance and legal authorities is hasty, and if implementing the request of 10 trustees who served the village through nearly 20 years and were personally aware of village problems is underhanded, then the present trustees are indeed guilty."

Advising householders to delay signing any petition "until they are sure they have an accurate picture", trustees said, "We are preparing accurate and convincing answers to the misleading and red herring statements made in the committee's presentation."

Trustees concluded with the reminder they are also recent ratepayers "and as such they would be most foolish to advocate any course of action that would be to their own disadvantage."
