### Markham May Vote Sunday Movies

Toronto theatre owner Barry Allen appeared before Markham Township Council Monday with a request that the people of the township be given the opportunity of voting on Sunday movies at this December's election.

Most of the Ontario municipalities where there are theatres now permit Sunday movies he stated and the law provides that the public is entitled to a vote to state their prefer-

Deputy-Reeve Stewart Rumble mentioned that as far as he was aware, no resident of Markham Township had ever requested Sunday movies.

While acknowledging he was not a resident of the township, Mr. Allen advised that he was building a \$700,000 theatre in it and was interested in bringing the matter before the public. Putting the question on the ballot would not indicate either council's approval or disapproval he said but would merely give the public a chance to vote on it.

Although Clerk Harry Crisp advised council that a by-law permitting Sunday published several weeks before a vote is taken, Council decided to hold the matter over until the next committee meeting as Reeve Charles Hooper was meeting.

Councillor Robert Sloane suggested that the question of Sunday sports might go on the same ballot.
