## In Magistrate's Court

Some confusion over the type of plea made by a Woodbridge man charged with impaired driving resulted in a brief flurry in Richmond Hill's Magistrate's Court last Thursday.

Gary Bell, about 23, pleaded not guilty to the charge but his plea was misunderstood by Crown Counsel Arleigh Armstrong who proceeded with the case by questioning Woodbridge Const. Andrew Nixon as if on a routine "guilty" plea.

The constable said Bell had glassy eyes and smelled of alcohol when he saw him in the village. He also noted the man wasn't wearing any shoes.

When Bell asked to state his own side of the case, Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake realized he was pleading not guilty and a remand to bring in further witnesses was granted to November 5.

Mildred Hicks of the Woodbridge area, charged with assault and wilful damage by her common-law husband Edward Hayden, was granted a remand to October 29 on the charges when her counsel, John Lawlor, of Richmond Hill said she was ill and she couldn't appear last Thursday.

He originally asked that the charges be remanded to January, 1965, but Mr. Hayden's lawyer, Donald Findlay of King City, protested.

Gordon Bruce Curtis a Unionville manufacturer was fined \$25 for his failure to file sales tax amounting to \$104.53 with the excise tax section of the Department of National Revenue in May and June. The amount was paid on October 15, court was told.

Bruce Tetford, a Toronto car washer, was charged with driving while disqualified by Markham Police August 1. Bail was set at \$500 and he was remanded to November 12.

Donald Stiver of Markham Village was fined \$100 and costs for theft of two wheel discs from a friend's car last July when he appeared for sentence

**Sponsor Exchange Teachers**  
The board also decided to sponsor two of its teachers in their application to the Department of National Defence for a two year tour of duty as exchange teachers. The teachers are Miss Florence R. Thomson of the MacKillop School staff and Douglas Winger of the Crosby Heights School staff. Superintendent Gordon McIntyre reported that whether their request will be approved depends on openings available with the department.

**No Photographs**  
A request from two local photographers for permission to take individual and/or class photographs during this school year was turned down. Trustee Deena Simpson reported that a meeting on the subject had been held with the school principals last year. The principals did not want photographs taken and the parents did not want it either, she said. The taking of such photographs would not appear to meet any real school needs and hence would appear to be more

of a matter of public relations, which could have had tragic results than an educational problem, Superintendent McIntyre stated.

**Marybay Lot**  
A firm offer of \$2,500 from the Emerald Isle Construction Company for the board-owned lot on Marybay Crescent was referred to the finance committee.

Trustee Deena Simpson and Principal Grant Nighswander of McConaghy School will seek a meeting with the police committee of Richmond Hill council to press their request to have southbound children from that school use Lorne Avenue and Church Street rather than Yonge Street. This would mean moving the crossing guard from Yonge and Markham Road to Church and Markham. The request has been refused by the police committee but the board felt that in the interests of children's safety the move must be made, particularly after the recent brake failure on a truck
