Scuba Divers Marooned On Island

Earlier this month, members of the Scuba Club of Thornhill Secondary School had an adventure they will not forget in a hurry.

Under the leadership of R. Winstall, with the school nurse Miss R. Montgomery, members Tom Osler, Doug Scale, Peter Large, Don Spears, Doug Carter, Jeff Coleman, Brian Blackburn and one hardy feminine member, Marcia Medcalf,

headed up to Christian Island to spend a day of scuba diving.

They rented a boat at Penetang and with their Indian guide, John Bosley, a man with 50 years' experience of piloting, proceeded to Hope Island. There they were taken on an interesting tour of the lighthouse by the keeper on duty. After seeing all through the lighthouse, they went out to do some diving on the "Lottie Wolf", a sailing schooner that had been down in the depths for 85 years.

They explored the wreck thoroughly and then went to another, "The Maple Don", a 300-foot steel ship which was sunk forty-five years ago. They spent some time here and had a lot of fun investigating the wrecked ship.

It was getting close to evening, so the group decided to head for the mainland. They all got settled in the boat but due to some freakish mechanical problem, the engine refused to start. After a long period of trying to get operational, with no success, they decided to pull the boat into shore.

They found themselves in a very rocky area at the northern point of Christian Island, where some of the rocks are as tall as houses. Mr. Winstall knew of a hut located on the island, and here they set up camp and built a fire.

Three of the boys took off to an Indian village, eight miles away, to notify the RCMP outpost there. In due time they returned with three very helpful Mounties. These men saw that they were supplied and comfortable and took down names, in order to radio a message to their post on the mainland.
