Reeve James Haggart cast the lone opposing vote Monday night when the police committee report regarding the unauthorized use of a revolver by a constable was considered by town council. The report recommended that the suggestions of Chief R. P. Robbins, plus a severe reprimand, concerning disciplinary action against an unnamed constable be ratified

It was explained by Councillor Walter Scudds, chairman of the police committee, that the constable had fired a warning shot when pursuing a suspect. This was against departyoung officer had been disciplined by losing four days leave when his case was heard by the chief.

The reeve stated he couldn't go along with the committee's findings. "I don't think a constable who shows any indication of being trigger-happy should be retained on the force," he said. "He should be dismissed immediately. It is our responsibility as a council to ensure the safety of our people and to see that safety is not handed over to one who does

something of this nature. Mayor Thomas Broadhurst explained that in cases of this kind a hearing of the constable in-

volved is held before the police chief and the chief is regulated by statute as to the punishment he can mete out. His recommendation is then subject to ratification by council as a whole. In this particular case, the whole of the committee felt they were dealing with a very serious

the chief. This is more serious than it may appear on the surface, the mayor continued since it goes on the constable's record and could be held against him in the

Councillor Scudds reported the police committee was gravely concerned about the matter but objected to the term "triggerhappy" being used when a young man carrying out his duty makes a mistake in judgment.

miss him for that.' Councillor Robert Saunders said that not too much emphasis could be given to members of the local police force that a revolver is to be used only to save a constable's life or the life of a citizen who is in danger.
