

# No Facilities Mentally Ill

York County Hospital's new psychiatric wing is not being used for mentally disturbed prisoners who come before local courts, mainly because there are no restraining facilities on hand.

Instead a dozen or so prisoners so far this year have been taken to the Toronto Psychiatric Hospital where there are specially designed cells where they can be cared for as well as kept in custody.

The county police committee said last week in its annual report that the security force is now four "doing an efficient and excellent job with little publicity".

Of this year's \$24,400 budget \$18,300 has been spent up to October 30, the committee said.

The four-man force has had charge of 321 prisoners in the Richmond Hill cells and 822 in Newmarket and made 858 trips to and from the Don Jail.

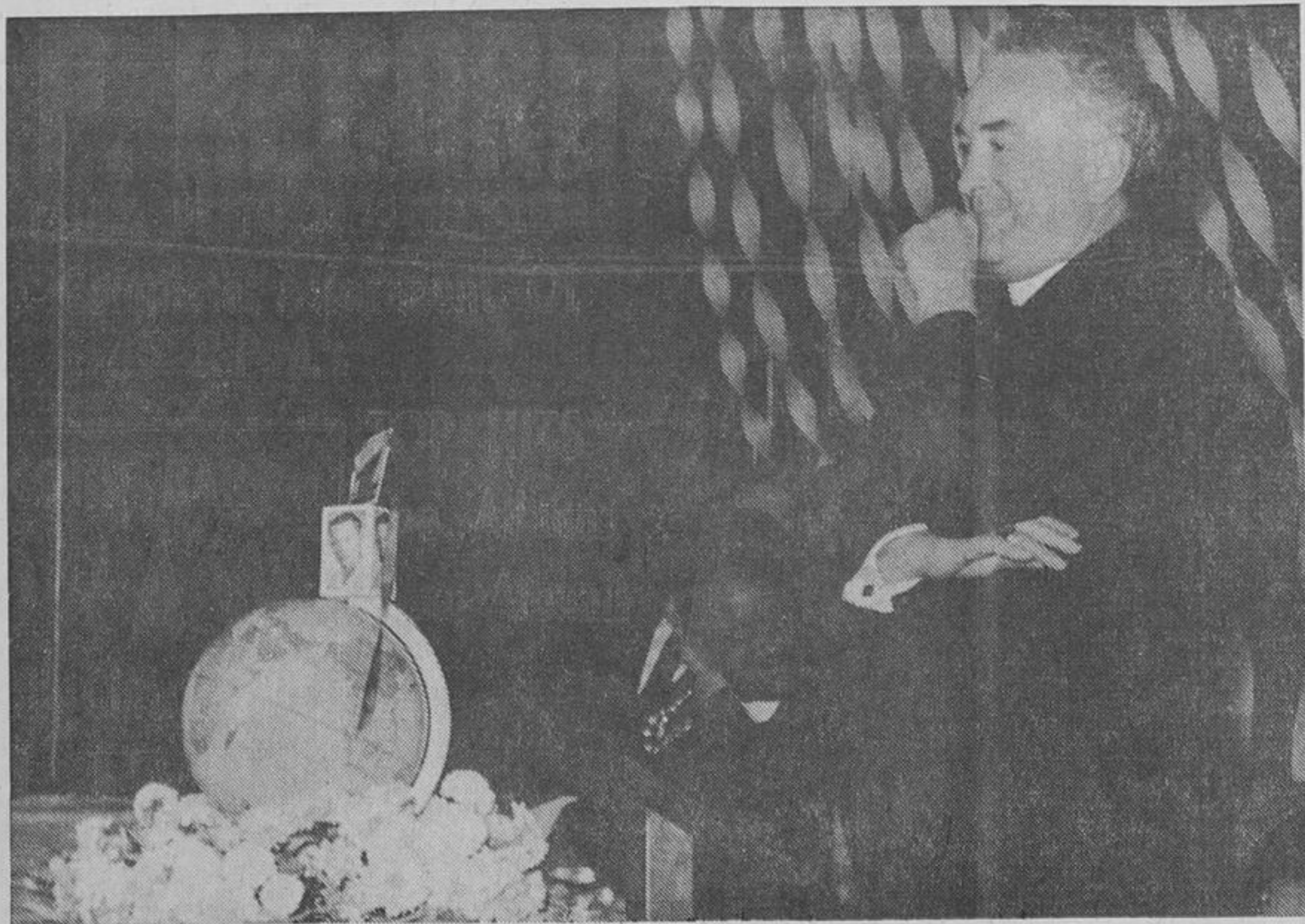
Only nine juveniles were in the force's custody, a decrease from last year, the committee said.

The filing system has been added to by the RCMP Wanted Persons, Missing and Released Convicts files and more requests for information have been coming from other police departments.

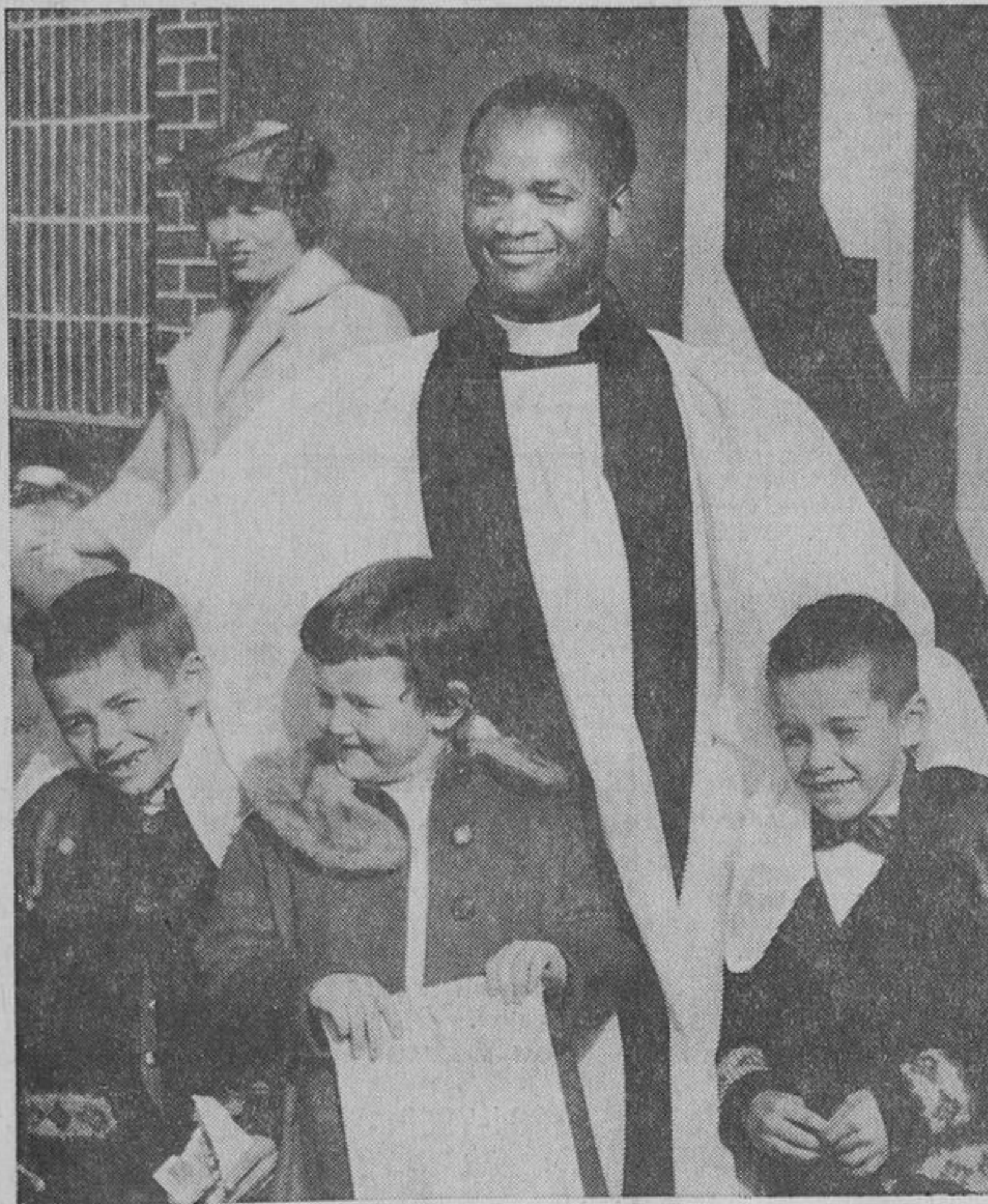

## Mark World Anglican Mission

What is Anglican World Mission is a question Anglicans are being asked at present. It is undertaking the responsibility of the world church in mutual fellowship. It is combining the reserves and needs of the Christian in Singapore with the Christian in Burundi and with the Christian in Richmond Hill. It is the mature expression of the fact that the arm of the body of Christ must act interdependently with the hand of the body of Christ. It is being and acting the new concept of brotherhood that the Anglican Congress of 1963 in Toronto named "Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence."

These points were emphatically pointed out and proven October 25 to the members of St. Gabriel Anglican Church in Richmond Hill East.

Rev. Shem Kararoro from Ankole, Kigizi, Uganda, Africa, in his sermon at the 11 a.m. service told the history of Christianity in his country and how it helped the natives in their daily lives and in their political life. In its period of independence adjustment, his country was not torn by internal strife as were many other new countries and Mr. Kararoro said it was because of the work of the first and following missionary teachers which supplied the leaders necessary to take hold and govern.

At 6 p.m. the Rt. Rev. G. B. Snell, Co-Adjutor Bishop of Toronto conducted sung Evensong. Magnificent voices of the boys' choir from All Saints', Kingsway, added much inspiration to this service.

A roast beef dinner was served by the women of St. Matthew's United Church at 6:45 p.m.

Chairman E. Nokes proposed the toast to the Queen and D. Danter proposed a toast to "Our Brother in Christ." Ern Sheh Liong, a 24-year-old theological student in Singapore.

He is a young man, whose education to become an Anglican priest in the diocese of Singapore, Malaya, is being supported by the people of St. Gabriel.

He is Chinese and will further the work of God among the Chinese as part of the Anglican World Mission. He will work to fight ignorance, poverty, superstition, want, need, confusion and the slavery of communism.

Following dinner the film "The Rebirth of a Church" was shown. This is the film of the 1963 Congress in Toronto.

Ernest Lowin, student assistant and theological student at Wycliffe College, Toronto, introduced the guest speaker, Bishop Snell.

The bishop pointed out the need of the Anglican World Mission and what mutual responsibility and interdependence is. He most emphatically noted this may very well be our last chance in many of these countries because if communism gets to them, they will certainly see that Christianity stays out.

## New Math Often Puzzles Parents

Parents who are puzzled over the new mathematics being studied by their children are often stunned after hearing Winston Bates, director of mathematics for the Toronto Board of Education discuss it at home and school meetings.

In grade 1 children learn about number lines, a form of mathematics formerly introduced in grade 13 analytical geometry. By the end of grade 1, children can solve algebraic equations formerly taught in grade 9 and inequalities that were taught in grade 12.

When parents are stunned as he explains the

base-7 and base-8 system of numbering, he reminds them the reason it is so difficult for them to think in these terms is that they have been steeped in the base-10 system for so long.

(This is the system that has you count 10, 20, 30, etc. In the base-7 system, you count 7, 14, 21, 28, etc.)

The children don't have the same difficulty states Mr. Bates.

While not claiming that the average grade 6 student will soon have the mathematical ability of the grade 12 student, Mr. Bates does claim that today's students will understand mathematics far better than their parents did.

Almost the exclusive preserve of office machines today, facility in calculation is not given the same stress as formerly. Much emphasis is placed on the child's discovery of the relationships between numbers and between operations like addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.

Mr. Bates played an active part in the in-service training course held last winter for teachers of Richmond Hill, and Markham and Vaughan Townships.

Richmond Hill's superintendent of public school education, Gordon McIntyre reports that the new math is now being taught

in all grade 1 and grade 7 and 8 classes in the Richmond Hill system and will be gradually introduced in all grades. It should be in general force in the system in two years, although this depends on the training of the teachers. In-training schemes will continue to be conducted until all teachers are familiar with the system.

Mr. McIntyre feels that training in basic calculation will not be neglected, but the emphasis will be different. He is confident that the students taking the new math will be better prepared to cope with secondary school and university mathematics.
