"King Township has received during 1964 a type of residential development throughout its rural area that should prove beneficial to the entire township," Mr. McCallum told "The Liberal."

"This is setting a pattern that is attracting an increasing number of Metro residents into the municipality desirous of establishing es-

'The recently enacted bylaw, increasing minimum residential restrictions, has been met favorably and generally has coincided with plans prepared in advance of the August 17 by-law," he

The current minimum requirement of 1100 square feet for a single storey dwelling replaces the former minimum of 900 square feet.


