Surgery Forced To Surrender Site

 Inform them. What do you want to keep from the press?"
 "Let's pass the expropriation by-law and then discuss the price" suggested the reeve.
 "I think you are most unjust. Something smells here," said Mr. MacKay.
 "It certainly does," agreed the reeve, and stated that Dr. Shouldice had said several times "if you want it, you'll have to take it."

When asked what his hurry was for two or three weeks, the reeve replied that council might not be in existence by that time and it might take another 10 meetings to get it through a new council.
 "I don't like any of this. I don't like smelliness being attributed to this council, Shouldice Surgery or the developers. I think the other side should have a chance to speak." When Mr. J. Friedman, solicitor, was finally allowed to speak he recapitulated the developer's position. He denied that the expropriation was being done as a favor to them and stated that they formed a relatively small portion of those who would benefit from the sewage disposal plant. Their original offer to

Dr. Shouldice, he said, had been based on the position that the land in question was valley land unsuitable for building and they had offered \$12,540 for 12.5 acres of land. Dr. Shouldice had talked about \$200,000, and consequently they saw no purpose in continuing the discussion.

Understanding also that Dr. Shouldice felt the site of the plant to be too close to the hospital, they had consulted again with the township engineers who, after study, had advised that a five acre site would do.
 "We have no secrets," said Mr. Friedman. "This is not a private deal between two negotiating parties, this land is needed for the township." After waiting six or seven weeks for the appraisal, they had gone ahead with their offer. "We have no idea what the evaluation of the five acres is," he stated flatly, and enquired just what the appraisal value of the land had been.

Both Mr. Friedman and Mr. MacKay were then given a copy of the appraiser's bulky folder.
 After studying it for a few moments Mr. Friedman continued with his presentation. They had made the offer in order to bring the matter to a

head, he stated and had indicated a price of \$25,000 cash for five acres of land. The offer included a \$1,000 deposit cheque. This had not been sent with the offer but the accompanying letter had advised that if the offer were acceptable the cheque would be delivered Monday. He also stated firmly that the offer had all the required signatures and was completely valid.

They had been asked for an extension of time on the offer he stated, but when a 30 day extension was requested had indicated that they were not willing to wait that long. They were then advised that the offer was not acceptable.
 "We did not have the appraisal as a guide," he noted.
 While at no time was the press or the public informed as to the figures contained in the appraisal ordered by the township, Mr. Friedman mentioned, "The relationship between the two prices is fairly evident."

Mr. Friedman concluded by stating that the developers were still prepared to negotiate "but we respectfully submit that we are satisfied our negotiations will bear no fruit whatsoever."
 In answer to a question from Councillor Sloane, Mr.

Friedman advised that it was customary to expropriate first and negotiate the price afterwards.
 Deputy-reeve Rumble still pleaded with council to leave it up to the two parties to negotiate the matter without expropriating the property.
 "We have heard both sides agree that it would be better if they would negotiate on their own but I move that the by-law be passed" said Councillor Sloane.

The by-law was then passed clause by clause with the deputy-reeve and Councillor Hoover opposing, Councillor Sloane insisting on a recorded vote each time.
 When the reeve then proposed giving the by-law a third reading, the same two members objected again.

The reeve then had the clerk read the pertinent rule, which stated that a by-law could be given three readings in one sitting if this was agreeable to two thirds of the council members, or the majority of members present.

"These are just delaying tactics. Let's proceed" insisted Councillor Sloane and the by-law was finally given its third reading and the meeting adjourned shortly before 11 p.m.

105th Warden's Banquet Glittering Affair

Speaker Strikes Serious Note On Schools

Elementary schools are where the best teachers should be. University of Toronto philosophy professor Marcus Long told more than 600 at last Friday's York County warden's banquet in Toronto.
 He said most schools were out of date and quality of teaching at the elementary level was absurd. "It takes only grade 12 and two years' waste of time at a teachers' college to be a public school teacher."
 Dr. Long warned that if a child is destroyed by the limitations of his teachers, there can be no replacement in his later life.
 "In 10 years, I predict a boy will have to have at least grade 14 or he'll have trouble getting a job."
 He advocated more technical training schools like Ryerson in Canada and less liberal arts colleges.
 "If I came to York County with a plan for a liberal arts college, I would be welcomed most graciously but if I had a plan for a technical college, I would have a hard time raising any money", he told the mayors and reeves and councillors in the audience.
 The banquet, an annual

affair to honor the current warden, in this case Reeve A. H. Rutherford of Vaughan Township, was held under the glittering chandeliers at the King Edward Hotel's ballroom.
 Mr. Rutherford received a huge signed plaque from his fellow county councillors, a silver banded cane, a traditional gift to the wardens and for him and his wife, Velma, a silver tea service.
 Master of ceremonies was North Gwillimbury Reeve Joseph O. Dales and presentations

Stratford Building Senior School

Senior schools are of prime importance in Richmond Hill following the local public school board's recent decision to introduce the tri-level system of education in this municipality. The first senior school is scheduled to be completely operational by September 1967, although some features will be introduced in September 1965, others in 1966 in Crosby Heights School. In fact, the rotary system of teaching is

already being used to a limited extent.

Because of the plans of the local board we thought our readers would be interested to learn that Stratford has started construction of its first senior school.—Editor.

Construction of a 13-room and gym-auditorium senior school in Stratford is well under way following sodturning ceremonies late in October. Dr. A. J. Macdonald, board of education chairman for that city, said at the ceremony the senior public school would provide the advanced training primary school students would find advantageous before moving into secondary school. The new school will be located on an eight-acre site on Huntingdon Avenue, just south of Avon Street.
 The first new public school in Stratford in 35 years will provide accommodation for grade 7 and 8 pupils from 50-year-old Avon, 74-year-old Hamlet and 35-year-old Falstaff schools. There are four other public schools in the city—Juliet, 52 years old; Anne Hathaway, 42 years old; Shakespear, 80 years and Romeo 91 years.
