IT REFUSED TO DIE

This is the story of a hockey league that refused to die. On many an occasion during the last nine years the league has been all but technically dead but in the face of frustrating odds, has always managed to survive. Incredibly enough the league has even expanded to include teams from Toronto right on up to Keswick. Financially the league has never been abundantly healthy but determination, with each team having touch- dian defensive work that inventiveness and the willingness of players to dig into their own pockets have kept it alive despite everything.

This is the tenth season of operation for the Richmond Hill Senior Hockey League and it now boasts nine teams. Back in 1955 when the league was born there were only four teams from the Richmond Hill district. Entries this year come from Toronto, Thornhill, Keswick Newmarket, Bradford, Downsview and North York. Richmond Hill is represented in the league by Richmond Hill Dynes, a well-known name in the local sporting world.

In the 1958-59 season it was a Dynes team that won the Town and Country Trophy, emblematic of a first place finish at the end of the regular schedule. The same team then entered the playoffs and won the Tip Top Trophy for winning the series to become the only team in the history of the league to win both awards in one season.

Styles of play have changed a great deal over the years. In the beginning the league featured wide open, fast, no-quarter hockey. Body checking was fierce and tempers flared high to produce some real rhubarbs. Some players suffered injuries that they could ill afford and out of necessity international hockey rules were adopted. This wise move attracted players who didn't greatly appreciate the blood and thunder until today over 140 players perform on the nine teams in the league.




