York Manor Superintendent Warren Elliott, 32, formerly of the Willowdale area was officially fired Tuesday when he admitted taking funds from the home.

The disclosure was made public at York County Council's meeting in Newmarket after several weeks of rumor that had no official affirmation or denial.

Mr. Willoughby said restitution for the amount missing was to have been made in full by Tuesday night but no specific amount was mentioned to council.

The superintendent who is married and the father of five small children was bonded by a Toronto firm.

High School Board Will Call Insurance Tenders

At Monday's meeting, the York Central District High School Board decided to discontinue the practice of having 50% of the commission on their fire insurance policies paid to local agents.

son, Saunders, Limited after de- had divided the balance of the commission, about \$350 among various agents in Richmond Hill, Markham and Vaughan Townships. They had offered to reduce the board's premiums (which amount to some \$4,300 annually) by 10% if the practice were discontinued.

Trustee Al Peck felt strongly that the board's insurance should be put out for tender. Business Administrator George Tindal advised however that it would not be possible to do this this year as the premiums were due in October.

A motion was accordingly passed that the insurance be renewed through the same agents this year at a 10% reduction in premium with the commission going only to one agent, but that the property committee look into the matter of putting the insurance out for tender next year.

Tenders for snow plowing at the schools were awarded to F. Powell at Bayview and Richmond Hill at \$7.00 per hour; Frank Watts at Thornhill, \$6.50 per hour; D. Copithorne at Woodbridge, \$10.00 per hour and L. Rose at Langstaff \$7.50 per hour.

It was suggested that the work at Woodbridge might also be done by Frank Watts at the lower rate but Trustee Robert Ross who gave the report for the property committee indicated that Mr. Watts had a small machine on hand in Thornhill to do the work but it would cost more to have it taken over to Woodbridge. The man at Woodbridge had a larger machine, which accounted for the higher cost per hour there.

A motion was also passed to have the Richmond Hill Parks Department prepare an outdoor skating rink at Richmond Hill High School to the west of the playing field, just north of the gymnasium. The school will have use of the rink until 5 p.m. daily, after which time it will be open to the public. The only expense to the school will be for floodlighting.

Bus contracts were awarded to Langdon Bus Lines at \$5.340 per school month and to Eloise Mortson at \$2,600 per school month.

The board agreed to pay for medical insurance at the rate of 50c per student for vocational students taking part in a vocational program going outside the school to business and industry, and not already covered under the blanket policy

In Magistrate's Court

Chris Kortov of Toronto got in a few early rounds of golf at the new Toronto Board of Trade Golf and Country Club in Woodbridge October 22.

But he beat the opening date by a few months and wasn't too appreciated because he brought his motorcycle along and was charged by Vaughan Police with chewing up the newly-laid turf and fairways.

George Clark of Woodbridge, said there were 10 to 12 inch deep ruts in the new greens.

He was remanded to November 26, in Richmond Hill Magistrate's Court.

Two charges of libel laid against Amalgamated Electric Company and two of its officials, general manager Sidney A. Smith and John H. Hannigan, personnel manager, were dismissed in court last Tuesday when prosecutor Lawrence Arnold of Toronto failed to produce any evidence.

Toronto Development Commissioner Walter Manthorpe suggested that legislation should be enacted to force municipalities to adopt official plans and update them every five years. He was participating in a panel discussion on municipal planning at the Appraisal Institute of Canada's monthly meeting in Toronto recently.

Describing municipal planning in Canada as an "appalling failure," the commissioner said most Canadian cities suffer from a lack of proper development because they don't have up-to-date official plans to guide politicians and developers in making intelligent planning decisions. For instance, he noted that Toronto's last official plan was adopted in 1949 and is out of date.

Mr. Manthorpe said society is only beginning to realize the importance of proper planning, pointing out that Toronto is facing a serious sewage problem but proper facilities can't be built until a comprehensive plan is available.

Most local planning boards are composed of "hack political appointees" who don't know enough about planning, charged North York Councillor Murray Chusid.

He suggested they be replaced by planning committees of municipal councils which would be responsible to a Metro planning board composed of highly skilled planners, architects and developers.

"Too often planning boards make political decisions at the expense of good planning," he said.
