Roman emperors were forced to provide revels and games to entertain a populace who didn't have the ability nor the desire to entertain themselves. Everything up to and including the food was all laid on and who cared anyhow?

Could be the time is close when we'll have to take a close look at what we're doing not only for children but what we're doing TO children as well. Let's get down to their level and find out what is REALLY wanted and needed. Some of the answers we get might be downright surprising and even unpalatable but at least we'll be making some progress and in the right direc-


