Local Folk at Fair
Congratulations to Will Boves who placed sixth in the sheep shearing competition at the Royal Winter Fair last week. The top four prizes went to the U.S., all of whom were young men in their twenties. Fifth place was won by Tommy Bowman of Stroud, long-time opponent of Wilf's. Apparently Tommy has placed just ahead of Wilf for several years now, but one of these times the tables may turn. Since this is really the only competition Mr. Boves faces all year, he was quite pleased to place in the second Canadian spot. The American boys shear twice a year on their own sheep, whereas Wilf shears only in the late spring-early summer season. This past year over three thousand sheep lost their fleece to his shears. In this year's contest, the competition was very keen, the highest score being 93 points and Wilf Boves scoring 86 points. Speed is only one factor in the judging, with handling of the animal and the rolling of the fleece also being judged. Contestants also use machines supplied by the fair.

The only man presently engaged in shearing in this area, Wilf may have to wait for his son David to help him since there seems to be little interest in this art locally. He may not

wait too long, for David who is nine hopes to start helping his dad very soon. Then, U.S. watch out!

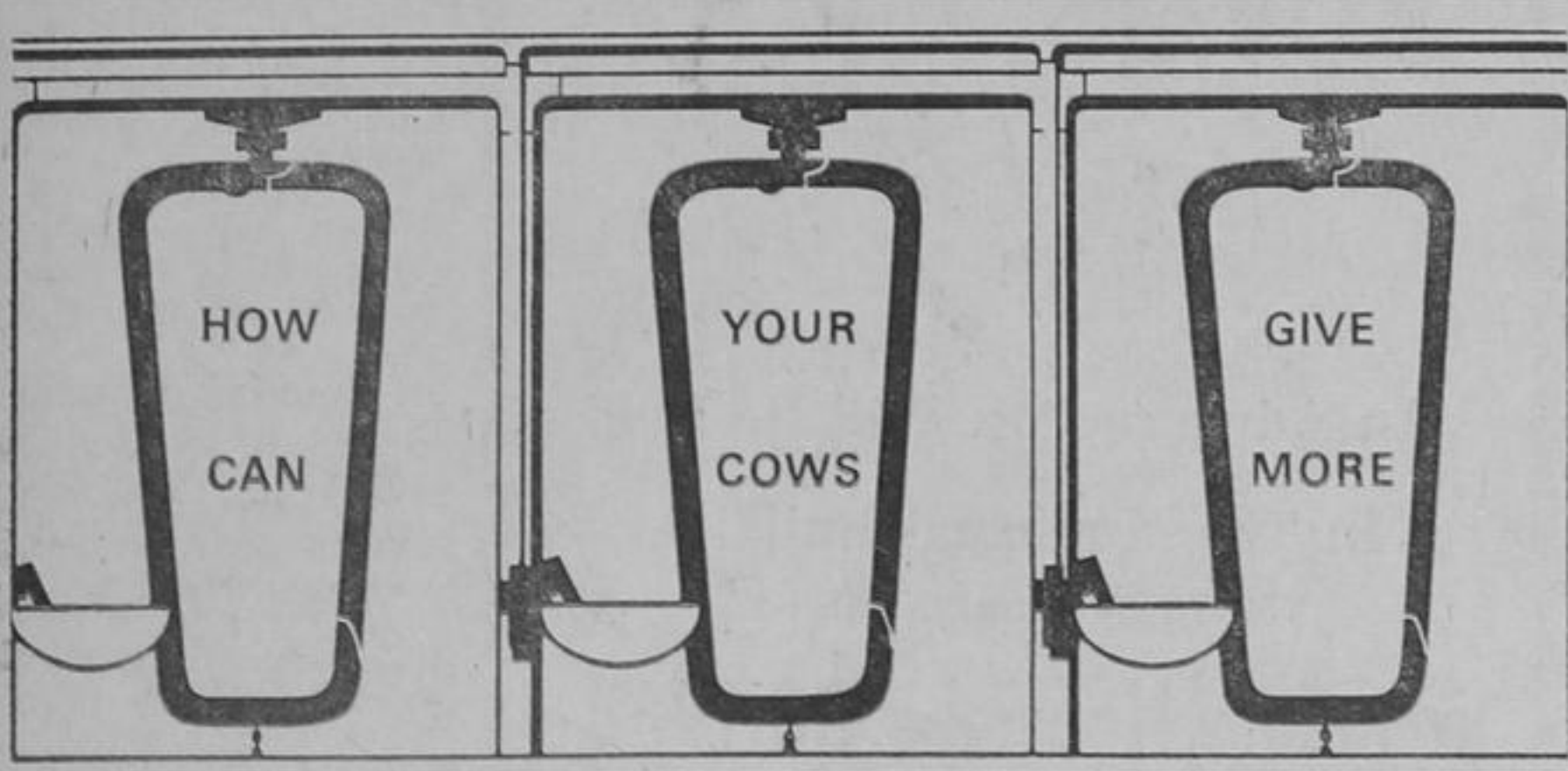
