Hall Once Scene Of Oyster Suppers Soon Dismantled After 100 Years

Edgeley's Community Hall is to be dismantled.

The near-century old building was damaged by vandals Halloween. Due to its age, present condition and general uselessness at present, it has been decided to tear it down.

The hall, built through public subscription, was first located south of Highway 7. During the years it was moved four times and was first called the Temperance Hall. It was used as a singing school and by the Society of Chosen Friends.

here the annual school Christmas concert was held for the past decade.

During the war years, the hall was the centre of many activities in aid of the war effort. The building was enlarged once and extensive improvements were made to its second floor to facilitate serving of suppers. In 1952, the interior was painted for the first time.

Edgeley's United Church may soon become a museum and antique shop. It has been sold to a private purchaser identity not yet known provided a clear title can be given the property. The transaction, due to be finalized soon, specifies the use of the old building.
