## Southwest Association Didn't Back Handbury

Charles Wortman, president of the Southwest Home Owners Association informed "The Liberal" this week that Eric Handbury the successful candidate in Ward 4 was not officially endorsed by the southwest association. Mr. Wortman was commenting on a news story in the December 10 issue of "The Liberal" which stated Mr. Handbury's election was backed by the southwest group.

Mr. Wortman said although individual members of the association had supported Mr. Handbury the association as such did not officially back any candidate in Ward 4. Mr. Handbury defeated sitting member Robert Saunders in the December 5 election.

## School Board Explains Stand Over Beatle Cuts

To be, or not to be a Beatle was the agonizing decision facing half a dozen Richmond Hill High School students last week when they were requested by school authorities to adopt a more conventional hair style.

Before their decisions were made, not only parents and school authorities were involved but two Toronto daily papers, a television station and several hundred of the student body. While none of those sporting the Beatle cut were expelled, or even threatened with expulsion, several other students who took part in a demonstration outside the school were suspended from school temporarily.

This gave rise to an after-school demonstration involving

Students with the offending cuts had been asked to report to the principal's office on the morning of December 9 to discuss the situation. High School Superintendent S. L. G. Chapman reports however that by 9 a.m. both he and the high school had had calls from the press and city reporters were at the school, evidently alerted the night before. Feeling that the students were using the press to fan up public opinion to force the school to change its position, school authorities therefore held the students incommunicado for the rest of the day.

Subsequently, a girl who had taken part in the picket line and appeared on television was suspended for a day until Mr. Chapman had had an opportunity of talking with her parents. Another boy, one of those with the Beatle cut, had appeared at Bayview Secondary School and when he was unable to give a satisfactory reason for his presence there, was told not

to come to school again until Mr. Chapman had talked to his father. A telephone interview was arranged for that evening and the boy was not suspended. Mr. Chapman emphasized that the students with the Beatle cuts had not been threatened with expulsion. "We simply felt that parents should be aware that we consider the business of identifying with groups that see themselves as something special is to be discouraged," he said.

At press time, two or three students were still wearing their mop-like hair style. While it appeared that few parents were really happy about it, one parent stated "When it gets to the point where my boy threatens to leave school and home too if he's forced to get his hair cut, I'd just as soon he were still satisfied to have their

boy continue wearing a Beatle cut, in the light of the school's position.

"I feel that the high boots, the black jacket and the long hair has each become the trademark of groups in society whose behavior is not acceptable," Principal L. B. Morrison's letter said in part. It stated too, "I recognize that parents have rights and responsibilities in these matters that are greater than the school's."

## In Magistrate's Court

Four members of a Stouffville hockey team appeared in Richmond Hill Magistrate's Court Tuesday to plead guilty for drinking under 21. All were fined \$20 and costs or five days.

They were James William Hood, 19, Robin Victor Hood, 18, Charles Howard Doyle, 19, and Robert David Hunter 19.

A Markham youth Kenneth Milne, charged with assaulting Guy Markle of Thornhill, asked for a further remand in his case Tuesday to hear Markham Police evidence. Milne is conducting his own defence and pleaded not guilty. Crown witnesses testified he struck Markle and knocked him down but Markle couldn't remember all the details leading up to and after the alleged incident at a Highway 7 restaurant. Remand was to January 19.

A Stouffville area youth will be sentenced today following conviction of three charges of break, entry and theft, one from the Sleepy Hollow Golf Club in Whitchurch and the other two from the home of Tony Calderon, RR 2, Markham. He pleaded guilty to all three counts on Tuesday.

Markham Const. Daniel Denby said Lorne Allan Marshman, RR 3, Stouffville, was arrested December 5 in Bowmanville and subsequently admitted the three counts.

According to the officer's testimony there was \$20 to \$30 stolen from the club cash box after it was entered around September 1. At the Calderon home, entry was gained November 28 through a rear door when \$75 in a wallet was taken and again on December 4 when a bottle of liquor was taken from a cabinet.

In Markham field and grass fires numbered 20 with dwelling fires numbering six and cars and trucks accounting for three, sheds and barns two and stores two.

Matches were again the main offender, causing 17 fires, with open flames being responsible for four, and incinerators for three.

Three children locked in bathrooms were rescued and 220 kindergarten children visited the fire hall.

The chief has carried out 209 inspections of premises in Richmond Hill and expressed appreciation for the courteous reception accorded him by the business people of the town. He said he felt that through their co-operation many fire hazards have been removed.

Twenty-two complaints regarding bonfires have been investigated and 27 in respect to garbage collection.
