New Provincial Park Near Atherly Ready

A new provincial park is planned to be in operation for the 1965 summer season. Mara Provincial Park, fronting on Lake Simcoe southeast of Atherly, should prove to be very popular with visitors and help relieve pressure on camping and bathing facilities at Sibbald Point and Bass Lake parks.

Boat launching, car parking areas, a good beach for bathing and campsite areas are some of the major projects which will be undertaken during the next few months to have all facilities in readiness for next summer.

Visitors to Sibbald Point Provincial Park on the south shore of Lake Simcoe near Sutton will also see improvements along the bathing beach. Removal of a number of dead tree stumps and other material caused by shoreline erosion has been underway and the area directly to the rear of the beach has been underbrushed and graded, according to Department of Lands and Forests officials.

Sprinkler System In Arena Recommended

Richmond Hill Council's finance committee Monday evening recommended to the 1965 council that an allowance be put in next year's budget for a sprinkler system in the arena.

Deputy reeve Stanley Tinker, answering a question by Mayor Thomas Broadhurst as to what prompted this recommendation, said that savings in insurance payments would pay off the cost of this equipment in a short time.

Reeve James Haggart reported the period would be about four or five years, reporting that with a sprinkler system the three-year premium is actually less than the present yearly rate in the unsprinkled building.

The reeve went on to note that with a sprinkler system there is a good chance of localizing a blaze if one should break out. As it stands now, if a fire broke out the entire arena would be lost, he cautioned.

"Another arena is a long way away," the deputy reeve added. "If we lose the only one we have we would be without artificial ice for winter recreation programs."
