Greeting Card Tradition Is Only A Century Old

Sending Christmas cards to one's friends is one of the most recent Christmas traditions. Each year the greetings seem to get more beautiful. In 1848 William Maw Egley, a "starving" young English artist, came up with the idea of designing a Christmas card and reproducing it on pieces of pasteboard for the public to buy. Egley's card showed a family Christmas dinner, formal dancing, skating, carolers, almsgiving, a Punch and Judy show and other aspects of a celebration resembling the one in Charles Dickens' "Christmas Carol". Unfortunately, the public was not enthusiastic about his idea. The "daddy" of all holiday cards was designed and etched in 1812 by J. A. Boerner, a young Londoner, who wanted to apologize to friends for his failure to pay a New Year's Day visit. Mr. Boerner's card made it clear he was tied to his home by depicting him with his coat caught in the locked doorway of his house. In 1843, Sir Henry Cole, a busy English "missionary" of culture, hit upon the idea of sending out little missives at Christmas. John Calcott Horsley of the Royal Academy designed the cards which Sir Henry sent to a thousand friends. It wasn't until the early 1860's that cards were issued for general distribution by a large English publishing company. Christmas greetings were introduced into North America by the Marcus Card Company of London. They became popular immediately. Louis Prang, a native of Breslau, Germany, lithographer, began a greeting card business in Roxbury, Massachusetts in 1874 and the next year exhibited his product at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia. Hundreds of American artists entered Prang's annual contest for card designs. However at the turn of the century he ceased printing them rather than compete with imports flooding the market. For the next few years the exchanging of cards was out of fashion. In fact it was only after 1918 that manufacturers on this continent began to build up a good trade in greeting cards. By that time inexpensive printing and lithographing processes brought Christmas cards within everyone's reach. Greeting card manufacturers report that billions of Christmas cards are now sold in this country.

Gang Persecutes Newmarket High School Teacher Since Hallowe'en

Douglas Holyoke, a teacher at Newmarket District High School for the past three years, has been subjected to continual harassment since the end of October by a group of teenagers. The Holyoke family has had demonstrations outside their East Gwillimbury Heights home telephone calls and on one occasion, an egg was thrown. They are concerned about the length to which the occurrences might go. Last week Mr. Holyoke recognized some Newmarket high school students among the demonstrators. When questioned by Principal F. W. Bradley they admitted taking part in the demonstrations, but denied throwing eggs or making nuisance telephone calls. The students claimed it had begun as a Hallowe'en prank but reached more serious proportions when outsiders joined in. They had no idea it would develop to the present stage, they said, and offered to use their influence with the non-students to have the incidents stopped. When the student council went on record as having no sympathy with these responsible, its head Lauren Marshall received an obscene note threatening her with the same harassment if she did not keep out of the affair. Mr. Holyoke reported that some of the youths seen at his home were driving their parents' cars and he and Mr. Bradley raised the question of parent control. No parents have yet been contacted but it was suggested by Mr. Bradley that this action may be taken. East Gwillimbury police are keeping the area under surveillance.

Vaughan Briefs

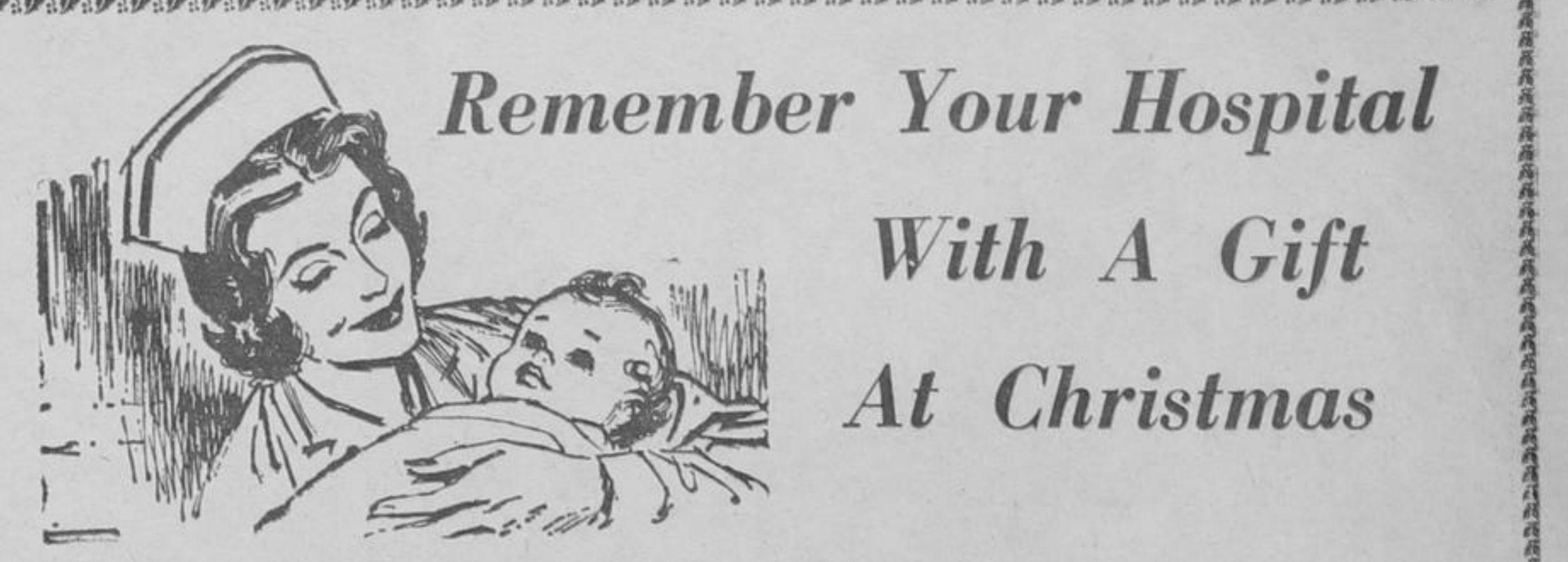
Vaughan Council was the only one of the three area councils to meet this week. Councilors officially appointed Morley Kinee of Maple as their representative on the York Central High School Board for a further three-year term. Council will sit as a court of revision at 3:45 p.m. December 30. Reeve A. H. Rutherford said it would likely be the court's last sitting since York County had agreed to provide county-wide assessment and such matters would be dealt with under county jurisdiction. Uncollectable taxes amounting to \$1,183 will be stricken from the township tax rolls following approval of a by-law put forward Monday. The amounts vary from two cents to \$185 and have been levied in subsequent years as they remained unpaid. Some, according to a report, were included in error and efforts to collect others have failed.

A former resident of Thornhill, Lady Robert Watson-Watt, 63, wife of Sir Robert Watson-Watt the inventor of radar, died at Sterling Forest, N.Y. December 19. Born Jean Wilkinson, one of eight children in Owen Sound Lady Watson-Watt was formerly Mrs. Drew-Smith and lived in Thornhill for nearly fifteen years. A widow, she married Sir Robert in 1952 and they subsequently built homes on John Street and at Church and Colborne Streets in Thornhill. They moved to New York in 1959 when Sir Robert became advisor to a colony of scientists there. Besides her husband, Lady Watson-Watt is survived by two children, Mrs. Douglas Reburn of Willowdale and Tony Drew of Newmarket, and two grandchildren.
