King City Village Trustees have reminded residents of a special garbage collection January 12 for Christmas trees "and other refuse".

Requesting householders to make sure all trees are put out for the special collection, trustees pointed out "It is most discouraging to find trees discarded in ditches after the collection has been made and we have no means of collecting and

disposing of them." Frowning upon the growing practice of leaving refuse in paper bags, trustees advise proper metal containers or the newer plastic bags used.

"Failure to follow regulations can only result in higher collection costs", with consequent increased rates to householders trustees cautioned.
