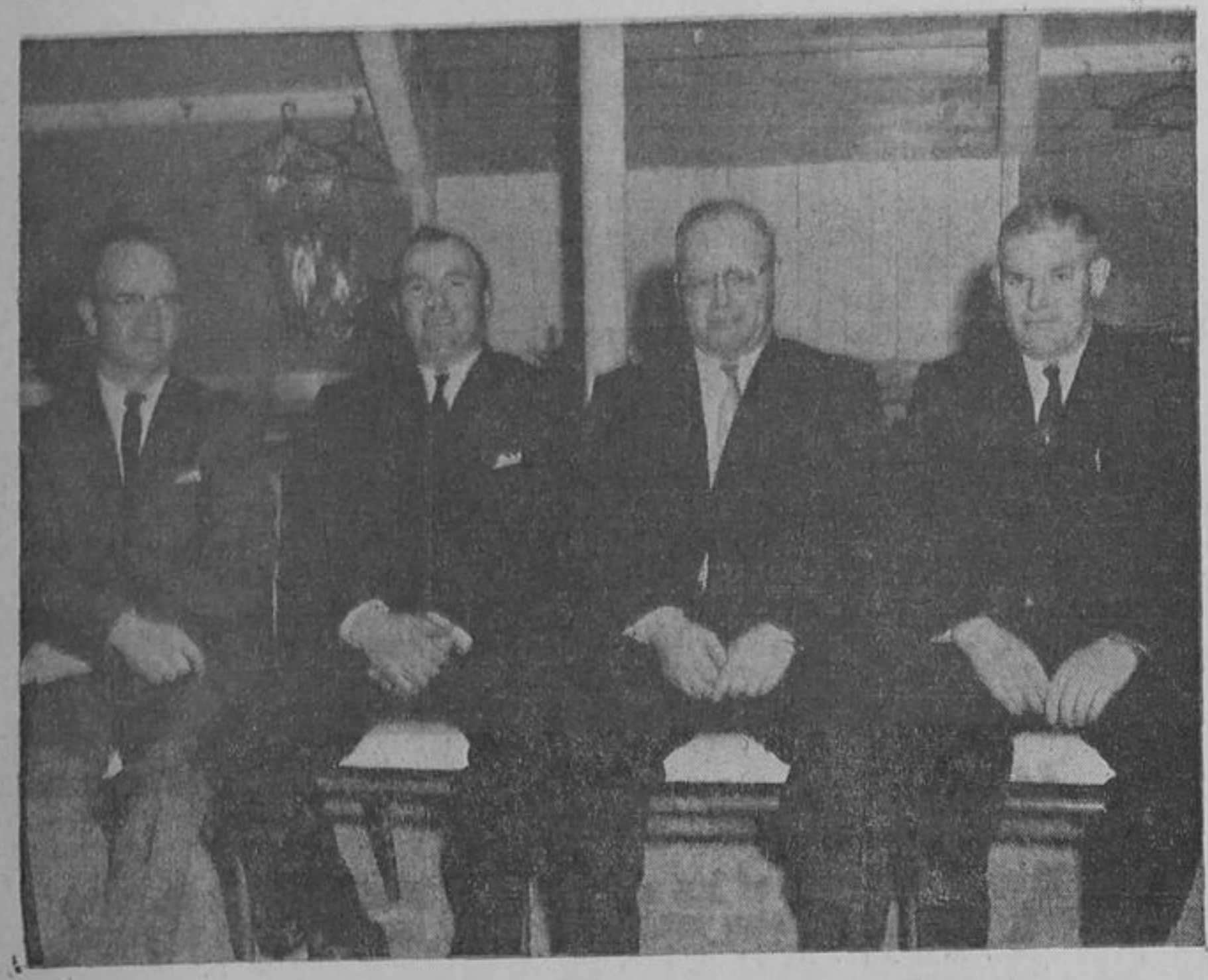

## N. Gwillimbury Reeve Named QC, Seeking County Warden Seat

North Gwillimbury Reeve Joseph O. Dales, this year seeking the post of warden of York County, was named a Queen's Counsel by Attorney-General A. A. Wishart December 31.

Mr. Dales who operates from a law office in Newmarket and is a member of the York North Bar Association was a Liberal provincial candidate in the York North Riding in 1955.

He has headed the county's administration of justice committee and last year was a commissioner of the county.

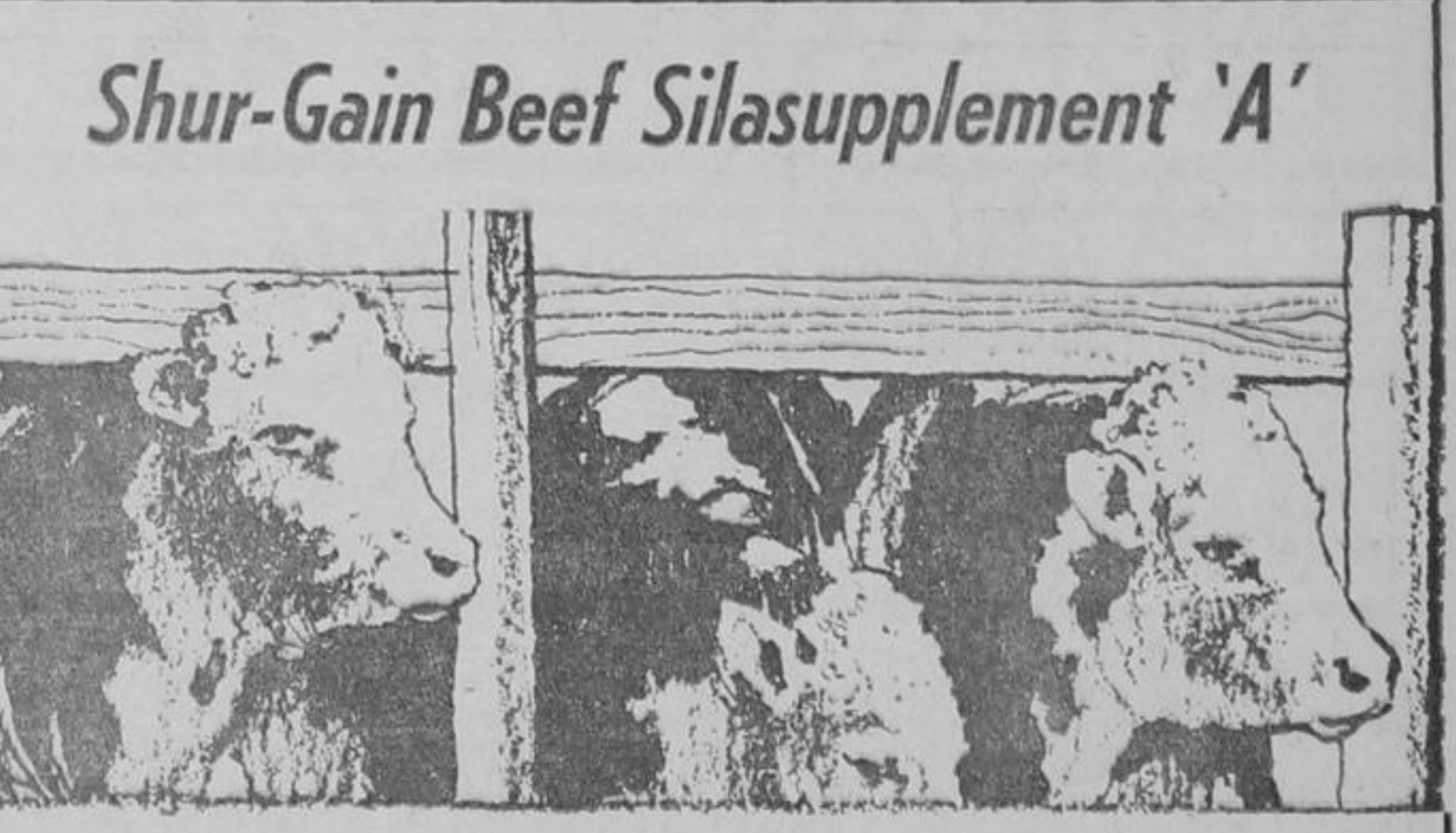

## Rouge River Dam Planned In Mkm.

Work on a \$250,000 dam on the Rouge River at Markham is expected to start early this year according to Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority.

The dam and reservoir, part of the MTRCA's flood control program, is the first project under a new provincial assistance program for work of its nature.

The province will pay 75% of the cost and payment of the remaining 25% is deferred until 1967.
