Honour Former Chief Librarian

In fond memory of a pioneer volunteer on King Memorial Library staff, the late Mrs. James Rock, three leading volumes have been placed in the library by family and former co-workers.

A resident of King City before she moved to Brampton, Mrs. Rock was treasurer of the village library since its beginning.

She succeeded the late Miss Marjorie Jarvis as chief librarian. The former Vera Janet Brown died last September in her 78th year.

Professor Eric Arthur's book, "Toronto No Mean City", an architectural record of the city's vanishing landmarks, and Winston Churchill's, "The Island People", are the generous donation to the library by a son.

They are inscribed, "Given to King Memorial Library by Mr. S. H. Rock, in memory of his mother, Mrs. James Rock, active in the founding of this library, and chief librarian from 1953 to 1955."

The gift from librarians who worked with Mrs. Rock is a copy of "Canada" with photographs by Peter Varley, son of artist Fred Varley, and text by Kildare Dobbs.

Fifteen years of faithful service to School Section 2 Board in King Township by Secretary-Treasurer Raymond Burt were recognized and honored by retiring school trustees at their closing meeting of 1964.

The 92nd annual meeting, held in Eva L. Dennis School, marked completion of service by the current board. Trustees William T. Heaslip, Gordon Ormsby, and Charles Ormsby. Administration of the section was being absorbed into the newly-formed King Township Board.

Among those attending were former Trustees John Whalley, Laurence Scott and Gordon Orr. After routine school, financial and insurance reports had been read, Chairman William Heaslip presented the retiring secretary-treasurer with a personal letter of appreciation. "On behalf of the pupils and parents whom you have served so well over these many years, it is a pleasure and privilege to you this token of our esteem and appreciation."

Mr. and Mrs. Burt moved to King City in 1945 after Mr. Burt retired as CNR customs agent. In 1949 he succeeded the late Mr. Arthur Wellesley in looking after the part-time secretarial and financial duties in connection with the only school in the section, then named King City Public School.

Mr. Heaslip completed three years on the board; Mr. Teley, seven, and Mr. Ormsby, one year. Earlier Mr. Orr served a three-year term.

King Township Tax Levy Past Million Dollar Mark

King Township's tax levy amounted to \$1,058,396 in 1964. Clerk Harold Rose told council at the first meeting of the year. This was the first time in history the levy had been over the million dollar mark, he reported. In 1963 it was \$974,219.

Of the total 1964 levy, 85.87% has already been collected, compared with 86.29% at the same time last year.

Deputy-revee Gordon Cook forecast the 1965 figure would show "another nice increase" due to the township's growth.

An 11:30 p.m. time limit was set for night meetings and a four and a half hour daytime limit. Usually the meetings alternate between evenings and daytime.

Council also decided to ask delegations to notify the clerk three days in advance of the nature of their business with council, to allow time to study the questions and prepare answers. However, it was agreed that "any emergencies will be dealt with at any regular meeting."
