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Maple's Discover First School

Now that the four buildings on the corner of Sherwood Side Road are being torn down, it was discovered that one of them was the first school in Ma-

A complete history of Sherwood is being drawn up by Roland Keffer and Mrs. Jean Bryson.

The log school house, 1842-43 was directed by a John Kennedy, That winter, it was recorded that a total of 58 students attendded at some time or anoth-

The house on the corn-

er was the first general store with a post office, which closed in 1926. Just when Sherwood was beginning to flourish into a regular little community, the railroad moved in in 1855, creating another village with it, namely, Maple. As Maple grew, Sherwood stood still in growth. eral other buildings were converted into homes.

Were it not for records, no one would ever know there was a Sherwood south of Maple. Before 1860, the school was relocated to its present position, George Bailey Public School.

When these buildings were being torn down, the log structure beneath the new covering showed it to have been constructed in the 1800s. An old superstition about a penny being placed under the doorstep of every building in those times to insure good luck, was recalled, and on examining one an 1844 penny was found.

Instead of being torn down now, the conservation authority has expressed interest in buying it and having it placed in Pioneer Village as an his-The store, school and sev- toric building.
