

Lorne Wells, W. Bailie Head Vaughan Sch. Bd.

Members of the 1965 and 1966 Vaughan Township School Area Board were officially installed in office at a joint inaugural ceremony held at the municipal offices in January 11 when the school board, council, planning board, committee of adjustment and the Maple Village Trustees were all installed in office.

The board's secretary-treasurer Norman Jackson called the meeting to order and read a letter from the clerk of Vaughan Township certifying the election results. These showed L. A. Wells elected with 2,388 votes, W. R. Bailie 2,294, R. S. Joffire 2,188, H. Goodwin 2,122 and Mrs. D. Robertson 1,835.

Mr. Jackson then administered the oath of office and oath of allegiance.

In accordance with the School Act, the trustees voted for chairman and vice-chairman by ballot and Lorne Wells was elected chairman and Warren Bailie vice-chairman.

Superintendent D. R. MacDonald congratulated the board members on their election and presented the gavel to Mr. Wells. He noted that the gavel had been presented by the board's first chairman, Herbert Constable with the request that it be passed on to each succeeding chairman. In presenting it to Mr. Wells, Mr. MacDonald said he did so with confidence that Mr. Wells would use it "to rule firmly but justly and with wisdom."

Mr. Wells stated that he accepted the office of chairman "with sober gratitude" and felt that the board, all the members of which had had school board experience, would function efficiently.

The chairman and Trustees Bailie and Joffire then retired to nominate committee members. Their slate showed Trustee Joffire chairman of the property committee, Mr. Goodwin chairman of the management

and Mrs. Robertson chairman of the finance committee and was accepted unanimously.

The board then passed two resolutions appointing Mrs. R. M. Edwards and P. N. Trant to the Thornhill Public Library Board and Mrs. R. J. Hofland to the Maple Library Board. Both these appointments were for two years.

The chairman then announced that the first regular meeting would be held on January 14, but because of a planning board meeting would not be held in the council chambers as usual, but in the council committee room adjoining.

Meetings of the board, which are open to the public are held in the council chambers at the municipal office the second Thursday of each month, at 8 p.m.

Dr. Langstaff To Mark His 96th Birthday

Still a very active man who retains his interest in the community he served for more than half a century, Dr. Ralph Langstaff, 27 Church Street North, will celebrate the 96th anniversary of his birth on January 24.

Dr. Langstaff, graduated from Trinity College and the University of Toronto and from Edinburgh University, before beginning the practice of medicine in Richmond Hill in 1891. He continued caring for his patients in the village and the surrounding district until his retirement in 1945. His medical career began in the days of the horse and buggy and saw the progress of temperamental motorized vehicles into the dependable automobiles of today.

More than 3,000 babies were delivered by the doctor during those 54 years of practicing medicine and many of these carry the name of Ralph honoring the physician who brought them into the world. Dr. Langstaff was named after Dr. Ralph, founder of the first school of medicine in Canada, mentor and friend of his father who also served Richmond Hill and district as a physician.

Town To Seek Water Well No. 6 At \$25,000 Cost

There is no immediate need for additional water supply in Richmond Hill, Deputy-reeve Floyd Perkins told council Monday night, "but if we wait until the need is present, with the amount of time it takes to locate water and develop it, we could be in desperate need."

An agreement with the Ontario Water Resources Commission for a proposed test drilling program was under discussion.

"As chairman of the board of works and bearing in mind the length of time it can take, I would request we get at it right away," the deputy-reeve said.

The agreement provides that the commissioner shall retain a well driller to do test drilling for water under the supervision of the supervisor of ground water of the commission and to develop as a well and test any such test holes as the commission deems advisable, and carry out necessary incidental work therefore including surveying, optioning and acquisition of property. The amount to be expended shall not exceed \$25,000, or \$5,000 a year for five years.

Council passed a resolution that the surplus revenue from existing water rates is sufficient to meet this annual bill.

When Reeve Donald Plaxton questioned whether the town's investment would be protected, Walter Scudds assured him that when water is found even if it is not within the borders of the municipality, the town has first preference. It will have a year to develop the well.

Mayor Thomas Broadhurst noted that location of a new well would also govern location of a new water treatment plant, which will soon be necessary, since the present one is nearing its capacity. The deputy-reeve noted that when water restrictions are necessary in the hot weather, it is not because of lack of water, but because of limitations of the treatment plant which removes iron. The mayor also noted that two of the five wells presently in use have an exceptionally high iron content.

Asked by Councillor Eric Handbury if water in sufficient quantities was found on the first test hole would it create an embarrassment, Councillor Walter Scudds replied, "Not half as much as if we have no water when it is needed."

Reeve Plaxton expressed the opinion that it is evident the well is going to be located outside Richmond Hill. "The commission will be the owners and I would suggest could allocate the water as they see fit," Councillor Scudds disagreed, noting that the commission is "acting as our agents and doing the work for us, providing we enter into an agreement with them."

Deputy-reeve Perkins noted that "we got into a hassle on well 5. Richmond Hill found water, then the owner deeded the property to Markham Township. We had to go to the Ontario Water Resources Commission to get them to do some 'horse trading' for us."

Clerk Russell Lynett noted that all debentures regarding water are now paid out of water revenues.
