A by-law setting time and place of regular sessions of King Township Council for 1965 has been approved by council. Two meetings will be held each month, on the first and third Mondays. On the first Monday of the month council will meet at 8 p.m. and will adjourn not later than 11:30. On the third Monday council will convene at 1 p.m. and ad-

journal not later than 5:30. Since Easter Monday falls April 19, the scheduled time of meeting will be April 20 at 8 p.m. Again since August 2 is Civic Holiday council will meet the following night and since Labor Day falls on September 6, the day of meeting will be

September 7. Both regular meetings in July will be held in the evening to accommodate the farm population. Regular planning board meetings will be held the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 8 p.m.

Whitchurch Police failed to report any accidents during a similar period.

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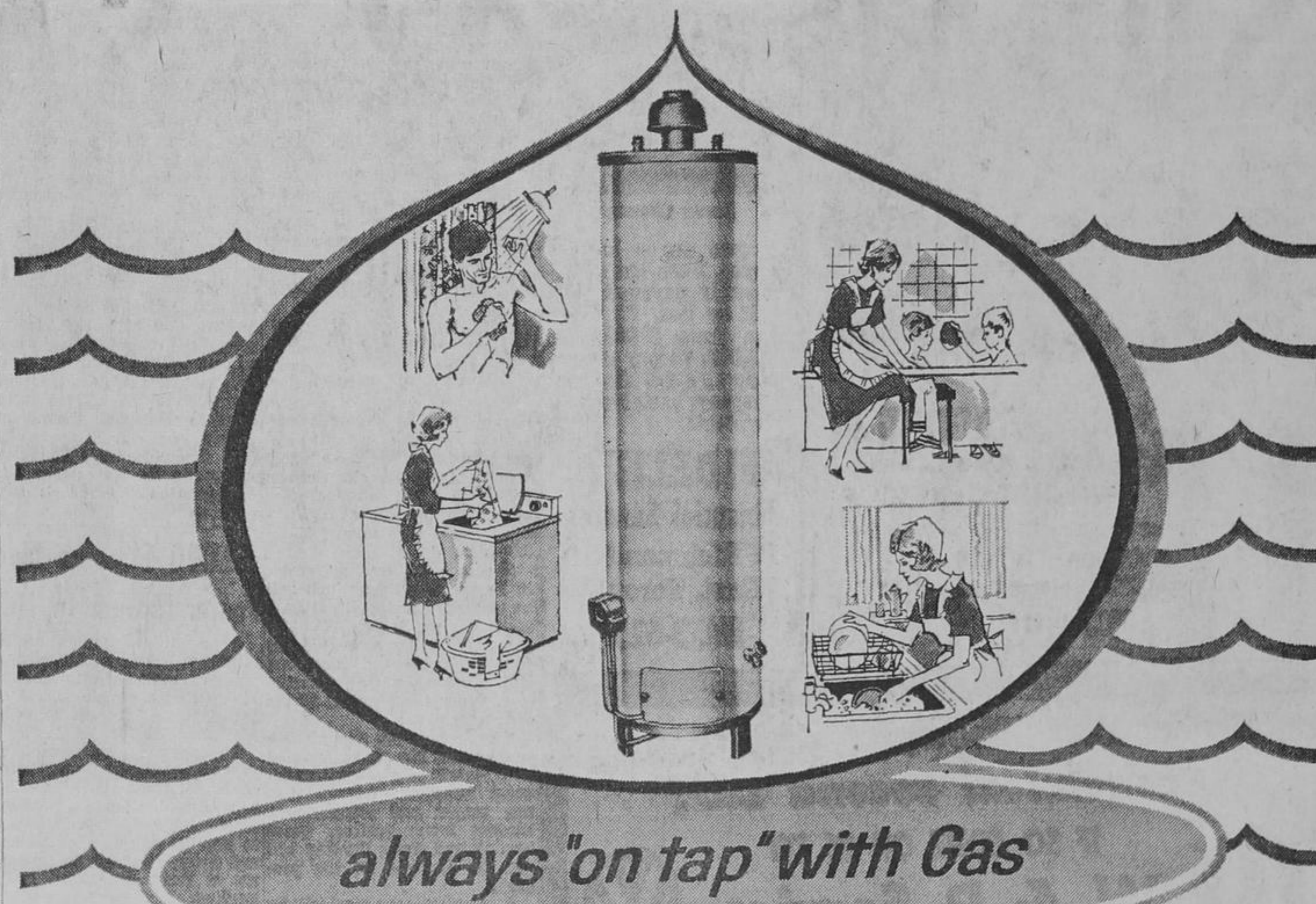
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Lake Wilcox Bowling
