A report of the 1964 warden and commissioners was presented by retiring Warden Rutherford. It indicated that the county had issued debentures to a total of \$1,410,000 during 1964 and paid off \$525,600 worth, making an increase in debentures for 1964 of \$884,400. Hospital costs for indigent

patients were down slightly in 1964, being \$26,155 compared to \$28,783 for 1963. During 1964, Mr. Rutherford reported the county had purchased 212.4 acres of land in the Township of Georgina for reforestation.



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
