**Druggists Not Counting On
Petition To Remove Sales Tax**

A scheme by the Ontario Pharmacists' Association to petition against an 11 per cent federal sales tax on prescription drugs, has received little in the way of favorable comment from Richmond Hill druggists.

It has also received little in the way of petitions in the way of support with the majority feeling that all the petitions in the world aren't going to change the federal government's present position.

The OPA has sent out petition forms to 2,000 druggists in the province in the hopes of collecting some 500,000 signatures from customers showing their opposition to the tax. The association will present its petition to Finance Minister Walter Gordon next month.

Some druggists feel that the tax, which is levied on the druggist's purchase, could lower prescription costs to the consumer by as much as a fifth, if removed.

"If we had a strong association like the medical profession, it might do some good," said C. M. Wight of Tamblin's Limited, Richmond Heights Centre.

"But I don't think it will have any effect. . . . No petition has yet." Alec Clarke, of Clarke's Pharmacy, said he was opposed to petitions as not reflecting the true picture of the people. "I'm not circulating them," Mr. Clarke said. "I just don't like petitions."

Said Hugh Wight, of Wight's Pharmacy: "I don't think I'll do anything about it. The petitions might have some bearing but we don't plan to take part ourselves."

Richmond Hill Councillor W. B. Lazenby, proprietor of Alencourt Pharmacy, said he had had some of the petitions on display but that not many people had picked them up.

"To do a good job on the petitions, we'd have to push them all the time," Mr. Lazenby said. "If it could be proved they had any effect, we wouldn't mind."

He said he was somewhat sceptical of petitions, however, as the Royal Commission on Health Services had already recommended removal of the tax, but nothing had been done about it.

R. Peary, manager of Beverley Acres Pharmacy, said he hadn't "much faith" in petitions and hadn't done anything about the association's petition yet.

"You can get people to sign anything," said Mr. Peary. "I don't think the government pays much attention to them" (petitions.)

There was one optimistic note, however. Walter Murray, manager of Mainprize Drug Store, said that, although the petitions might not be that effective, they at least gave people a chance to voice their opinions about such things.

"Then they get to the government, where these things should go," Mr. Murray said.

**Approve Markm
Garbage Pact**

Markham Township Council last week approved of a new garbage disposal contract with Miller Paving Co., at a cost of nearly twice as much as its previous contract.

However, the new agreement, which will cost \$29,652, calls for twice-weekly collections, compared with one before, and is for five years. The contract will run from February 1, 1965, to December 31, 1969. Miller will also provide the location for disposing of the garbage.

In its previous agreement, which was also with Miller, cost was figured on a pickup basis—there was no contract—and the company was at first paid between \$6,000 to \$8,000 for a certain number of pickups, and then an increase when it agreed to make additional summer pickups.

The new agreement works out to 27 cents a household per pickup. "It looks to me like a very good contract," commented Alan Sumner.

"That's what is called an incidental appointment," remarked Councillor Bryce.

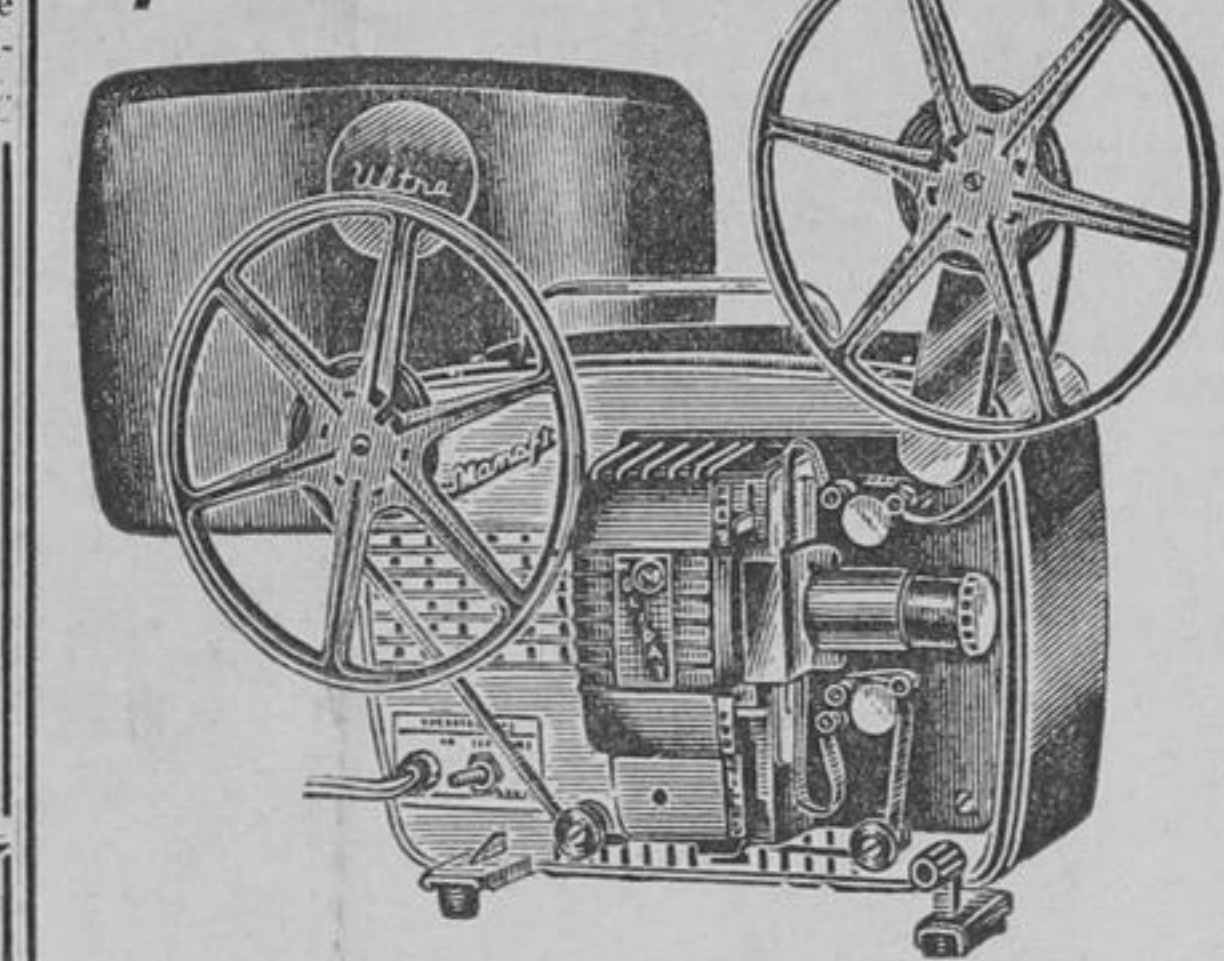

**Objections To "County Planner"
New Man "Planning Consultant"**

Heated words were exchanged at the January 20 meeting of the York County Council, held at the county building in Newmarket, over whether council's new appointee Conroy Dowson should be called the "county planner" or "planning consultant."

Reeve E. J. Norris of Georgina Township insisted that the by-law creating the position had termed it "consultant."

"Does he do planning for the county?" he asked. "If we adopt this (part of the 1964 warden's report) he is a planner." Mr. Norris insisted and moved that the word be changed to consultant.

Reeve J. O. Dales of North Gwillimbury accused Mr. Norris of making a play on words. The term "consultant" he said, made the position sound a part-time or temporary one. If Mr. Dowson had been called a planning "director" it would indicate that his duties went beyond that of a consultant and the committee had therefore designated him a "planner."

Reeve Donald Plaxton of Richmond Hill enquired whether the by-law did not set out the man's duties.

When the by-law was finally produced and read it was found that the position was termed that of a "planning consultant"

and that his duties were to make studies of the physical, sociological and economic development of the county, to conduct research activities, to give advice to council "and such further and other duties as may be from time to time authorized."

The majority of council then voted in favor of Mr. Norris' motion and Mr. Dowson was designated in the report a "planning consultant" as he had been in the original by-law.

Mr. Dowson was chosen from among five applicants interviewed by the county planning committee last fall and began his duties January 1 at a salary of \$11,500 per annum, plus car allowance.

A graduate of the honors geography course at the University of Toronto and of the town and regional planning diploma course, Mr. Brown was awarded the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Fellowship in 1958.

After a year as zoning administrator for Scarborough Township, Mr. Dowson was senior planner for North York for two years. He spent five years in Niagara Falls and resigned his position as planning director there to come to York County.

**Rowdyism At House Of Concord
Brings Jail Terms To Two Youths**

Two youths from the House of Concord, who Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake said were "not going to jeopardize the future welfare" of other inmates, were convicted last week in magistrate's court of having liquor in a place other than a dwelling.

Vaughan Township Constable Jim Mabley said he had been called to the Salvation Army home for boys about 11:15 January 19 to apprehend Thomas Hull, 20, and Reginald Mitchell, 17 who "had the whole house in an uproar."

He said they had consumed a half-dozen beers between them and had an unopened bottle of rye on hand. Every light in the house was on and all the rest of the boys in the home were up.

Magistrate Hollinrake said the House of Concord had been doing "a wonderful job," whatever the youths might think. Having the Salvation Army take on the responsibility of delinquent youths relieved the courts from sending them to jail or reformatory.

He said, however that he was going to sentence Hull and Mitchell because the youths had made it difficult for both the staff and the other youths.

The two were fined \$50 each, with an alternative of seven days. Hull and Mitchell, who were on probation at the time of their arrest, now also face breach of probation charges.

Fined \$25 and costs on a similar charge was Marguerite Weston, Toronto, who was arrested in Richmond Hill December 9 after she was observed driving in an erratic manner down Yonge Street.

A part-bottle of rye was found under the driver's seat. Peter MacElwain, 16, of 305 Bluegrass Boulevard, was fined \$15 and costs when he was convicted of drinking while under age.

Constable John Kelly of Richmond Hill testified that he had seen MacElwain lying on the side of the road on Church Street December 28 about 11:50 p.m.

The accused then got up and staggered down the street before being apprehended. Constable Kelly said. He smelled

slightly of liquor and admitted to drinking some beer.

In sentencing MacElwain, Magistrate Hollinrake said that the fact that the youth's parents had come to court showed that he would probably be further dealt with, "and would do more good than I could by imposing a large fine."

A charge against Wilfred Comeau, 96 Roseview Avenue, of supplying MacElwain and another youth with liquor, was dismissed.

Both MacElwain and a companion, William Hassall, 16, of 260 Anzac Crescent testified they had come across the beer in a refrigerator in Comeau's apartment. Comeau, however, was unaware they had it, they said.

Constable Douglas Young, who investigated the incident, said the youths had told him the same thing at the time they were first questioned, although later admitted the possibility Comeau might have seen them with the beer.
