



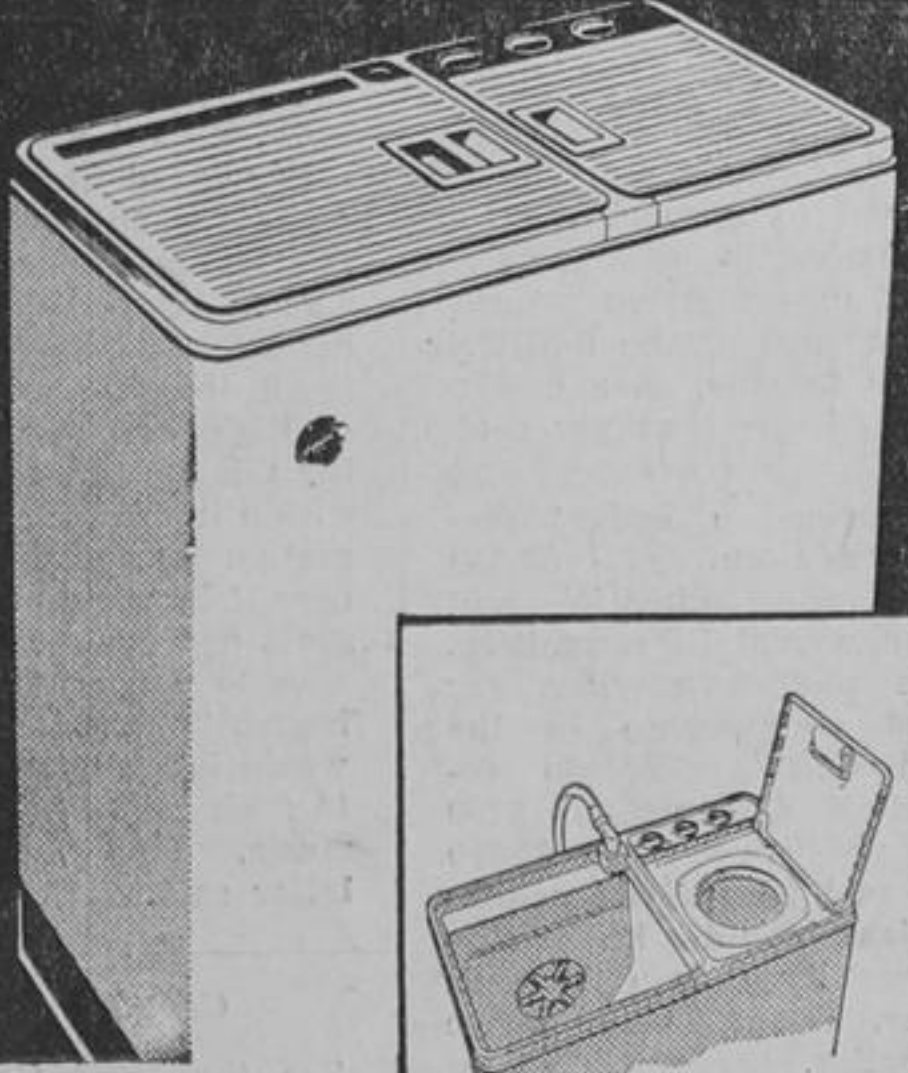

Public School Board Back In Book-Buying Business, Library Out

Richmond Hill Public School Board is back in the book-buying business. At its regular meeting last week, the board announced that it would no longer be dependent on the Public Library Board to make its purchases, or provide any more part-time services of a librarian in the schools.

The board made its new position known in a report on library services from Superintendent Gordon MacIntyre. He reported that last year's government grant for public schools in the purchase of library books, now made it cheaper for the boards to do their own buying than to get them through the library boards.

As a result, the board, also, will ask town council not to include its regular grant of \$3,500 in the library board's budget.

No Immediate Increase In R. Hill Taxi Fares

Despite Metropolitan Toronto's recent decision to raise taxi fares, Richmond Hill taxi owners will stick with the same old fare—at least for the time being.

An increase, however, says A. Leckie, owner of Richmond Hill and Richvale Taxi, 56 Yonge South, is definitely in order.

"We have a 30-drop now, which is about the lowest in Canada," said Mr. Leckie.

He said that the term meant that the cabs started out with the minimum fare on the metre set at 30 cents. This was 10 cents below the previous Metro fare and 20 cents below the new one.

Mr. Leckie said he didn't have any plans about going after a fare raise right now, but would consider it for the future.

A spokesman for Richmond Hill's other cab company, Plaza Taxi, 250 Yonge Street North, said the company did not plan any price hike at this time.

Remand UIC Case In Magistrates Court To Next February 11th

A man accused of an offence under the Unemployment Insurance Commission Act, had his plea of guilty reversed by Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake, when he appeared in magistrates court last week and the balance of his hearing remanded to another date.

Ardist Harvard, 379 Alper Street, Richmond Hill East, who operated as a latherer from his premises, was charged with failing to produce his payroll records for inspection by the UIC last September.

David Fife, an inspector with UIC, said three calls had been made to Mr. Harvard's house in August by the UIC to arrange a date, but inspectors had been unable to make any contact with accused.

He was then notified by registered mail, which was never picked up from the post office, and then by letter. The letter was not returned, Mr. Fife said.

He said the information against Mr. Harvard was not laid until January because the commission had not wanted to carry out any actions in December, and also, because it felt it would be hearing from Mr. Harvard at any time.

In his testimony, Mr. Harvard said his records were in audit at the Workmen's Compensation Board at present, and that he hadn't been carrying on any business for some time. He said, too, that he had not been contacted by the commission after September 29, the time named in the UIC's complaint.

"Why did you plead guilty?" asked Magistrate Hollinrake.

"Because they haven't seen my records," said Mr. Harvard.

Magistrate Hollinrake said he would change the accused's plea to not guilty and remanded the case until February 11.
