A. S. Mathers, Designer \$50 Monthly

Dunlap Observatory Dies

Designer of the David Dunlap Observatory, Richmond Hill, Alvan Sherlock Mathers, 69, died last Wednesday at his Beechwood Avenue home in York Mills. He was a partner in the Toronto architectural firm of Mathers and Haldenby, formed in 1921.

Among the many other notable Canadian government, business and university buildings, designed by Mr. Mathers, are listed restoration of the Library of Parliament and the Archives building in Ottawa, the Treasury Building at Queen's Park, the United States consulate at Toronto and Quebec, the William H. Wright building which houses the Globe and Mail, the Imperial Oil building, the Bank of Nova Scotia building and the Bell Telephone head office.

He designed several buildings for the University of Toronto, including the Sigmund Samuel building, the Best Institute building; also several buildings for Dalhousie University at Halifax, including the Sir James Dunn Science Building.

In 1959 he became the second Canadian to be elected a corresponding member of the Academie d'Architecture of France. The honor is limited to 50 foreign architects.

The funeral service was held Friday in Grace Church on the Hill with interment in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

MARKHAM: Markham Horticultural Society enjoyed a banner year during 1964, it was reported at the society's annual meeting, with 100 members recorded and excellent attendance throughout the year.

AURORA: Council will study formation of a committee to co-ordinate activities of various boards now in existence as the first step toward a long-term planning program.

AURORA: The Banner, the Barrie Examiner, the Hamilton City Enterprise and four Toronto papers have been selected by the Canadian Library Association to be permanently preserved in the association's micro film project of "Confederation Newspapers".

ALL the members of the Bogartown club took part in a demonstration of good posture. The girls were dressed in black skirts and white blouses and this uniformity made their demonstration very effective.

The exhibit of the Temperanceville club on "How to Look Your Best" stressed color combinations. Co-moderator was Anne Paxton. Mrs. B. Prentice and Judy Paxton are leaders of this group.

Mrs. A. Bishop and Mrs. Louise Lowe, leaders of the Vellore club had their group do a skit on good posture. Taking part were Helen Spencer, Valerie Watts, Rosanne Cudia and Nancy Lowe.

Visiting home economists, Mrs. R. Clarke and Mrs. M. Taylor commented on the exhibits, praising club members for their originality.

Mrs. G. France, district president of the Women's Institute presented provincial and county honor certificates to eight members, including Wanda McClure, Bogartown, Mary Darlington, Edgeley and Brenda Jorgenson and Nancy Jennings of Temperanceville.

Climax of the afternoon was a fashion show in which all club members modelled the attractive dusters they had made while taking part in the project "Being Well Dressed and Well Groomed."

The program concluded with Miss Austra Janitis, home economist for York County, presenting the 4-H Homemaking Club sterling silver spoons to all those who completed the project successfully.

NEWMARKET: A new system in committee formation has been adopted by council. Two main groups will be formed — one administrative, the other operational. The first will consist of finance and welfare, industry, planning and bylaws; transportation and bands. The second will be public works, property and garbage and police and fire. The chairman of each committee only was named and they will be members of all committees in that grouping with a co-ordinator making four members. The co-ordinator will be responsible for meetings of committees in his group.

King School Bd. OK's Honorarium

The first regular meeting of the new King Township Area School Board since its formal inauguration early in January was held in the kindergarten of the Eva L. Dennis School in King City, January 28.

The payment of honorarium for trustees was discussed briefly and a motion to pay them \$50 monthly was carried unanimously, although Trustee Jack Van Luik was somewhat disturbed to find that there would be no grant paid towards it.

"I have heard from a number of teachers and ratepayers and they are happy about the calibre of their board. You should have no hesitation about this whatsoever," stated John Lewis principal of Kettleby School on behalf of the teachers present.

It was announced that 21 applications had been received for the position of secretary-treasurer to the board. These will be studied by the finance committee and all members of the board will be invited to attend interviews with the applicants.

The first hour and a half of the meeting was taken up with considering a mass of correspondence.

A letter from the board of trustees of the King City Library advised as appointments to the board made by SS 2 had not yet expired, the new school area board would not be able to make an appointment.

Chairman Geoffrey Pierpoint noted that the local separate school board had approved the board although it had no schools in King City. "The township board has two schools in the police village and yet has no appointee," he said.

On a motion of Vice-chairman Wilbert Jennings it was agreed to write to the library board and ask for clarification.

A letter from the King City Home and School Association asked for the use of the kindergarten for their monthly meeting; the use of the staff room for an executive meeting once every two months; and the use of a classroom each Wednesday afternoon from 4 to 6:30 p.m. for a class in French conversation.

After checking with representatives of the teachers' association who were present at the meeting about the feeling of teachers on use of the staff room, the board agreed to this use of the school.

It was also agreed that the property committee would study a form to be used by all organizations wishing to use the schools. The forms would probably be filed at the school with the principal so that no confusion would arise as to when the schools were to be used by outside organizations.

A letter from the King Township Teachers' Association requested that the board meet with their salary negotiation committee to work out a single salary schedule for the township. It was agreed that such a meeting be held at Kinghorn School on February 1.

It was also agreed to provide transportation for 35 pupils from S.S. 4 to take part in the Kiwanis Festival at Toronto February 24. Vice-Chairman Jennings noted that several of the schools in the township had taken part in the festival in past years and had done well.

A letter from Mr. Fife chairman of the professional development program invited board members to participate with teachers from Mr. McLeod's incorporate in the professional development day, February 26, at Toronto Teachers' College.

A letter from Deputy Minister of Education H. S. Elborne gave the board permission to hire Miss C. Osborne to teach Oral French for one year, on the condition that they had advertised for an Ontario qualified teacher for the post but had been unable to find one.

A letter from a piano tuner, B. E. Carson of Millbank Avenue, Toronto offering to tune the school pianos for \$10 each, with no mileage charge, was referred to the property committee. Trustee Gordon Tolley suggested that they should check to see if any of the old boards

had had a local person who did this work for them. "We should look at the pianos first to see if they're worth tuning," interjected Trustee Mary Hayward.

A letter from the King Co-operative Kindergarten asked that a meeting be arranged to discuss the relationship of their kindergarten to the school system in the township. This was referred to the management committee for discussion.

The board thanked Principal John Lewis of Kettleby School for a memorandum of his method of ordering bulk supplies for his school and for other helpful advice to the board.

Mr. Lewis was advised to not accept any further payment from parents for supplies until the board formulates a policy on the matter. Pupils at Kettleby School had habitually paid \$1.25 in September and \$1.25 in January for pencils, pens, notebooks, etc. It was noted that some school boards in the township had paid for all consumable supplies, while others had paid for none.

Mr. Lewis had also asked permission for the children to attend the annual Kettleby community picnic. This had formerly been financed by the Kettleby School Board and held each year at Sibbald Point Provincial Park on Lake Simcoe. Mr. Lewis stated that usually between 80 and 100 adults and 200 children attended the picnic and transportation costs about \$35 per bus.

While the board was in favor of continuing the picnic, transportation costs were held over for further discussion.

"This is a social gathering," stated Trustee Mary Hayward. "It's a good thing but I don't think we should pay for it."

Inspector McLeod confirmed that as there did not appear to be any educational aspects of the trip, it would not qualify for an attendance credit.

Standing committees were set up at a special meeting of the board on January 14. Trustee Gordon Tolley is to be chairman of its finance and insurance committee; Trustee Jack Van Luik of the property committee; Vice-chairman, Wilbert Jennings will chair the transportation committee and Mr. Pierpoint will chair the combined management and planning committee, which includes all members of the board.

The board will meet the fourth Tuesday of each month, at different schools. The next meeting will be held at Kettleby School, February 23.
