In the current issue of the national magazine of the Royal Canadian Legion, Dominion President Fred O'Brecht, wrote a guest editorial entitled "The Legion And The New Flag". In it he said that the Legion was one of many organizations that opposed adoption of a new flag by the Pearson government. The failure of the Legion's opposition was due in large measure to the unfortunate fact that the flag issue had become a party political matter, a field into which the Legion as a non-partisan organization could not and would not enter.

The day on which the Canadian Red Ensign is hauled down for the last time will be one of poignant sadness for many local Canadians who sincerely love the Ensign. But as loyal and law-abiding Canadians they will accept and respect the new emblem which their parliament and sovereign have proclaimed as the national flag of Canada. The dominion president's conclusion of the article is quoted thus: "At this crucial juncture in the history of our beloved country I commend to members of the Legion, and to all Canadians of tolerance and goodwill, the following words, taken from St. Paul's Epistle to the Ephesians:

'Let bitterness and wrath and anger... Be put away from you'. For the sake of Canadian unity I sincerely hope that this ancient but ever-timely exhortation will be heeded throughout the length and breadth of this dear land."

The editor of the "Legionary" has informed readers that the replica of the Canadian Red Ensign which had appeared on the front cover since March, 1963 has been removed by order of the dominion executive council of the Legion. Also in the best interests of Canadian and Legion unity, the dominion officers have requested the "Legionary" not to publish letters to the editor or branch resolutions dealing with the flag.

This week the president of our branch, Frank Barrett, said that the new Canadian flag will be hoisted at Legion Court very shortly. A flag is at present on order. The Canadian Red Ensign will also continue to be flown, as it was adopted as the official colour of the Legion at the dominion convention in May 1964.

The dominion convention being the governing body, the supreme authority of the Legion, this resolution remains in effect, until such times as another dominion convention may decide otherwise.

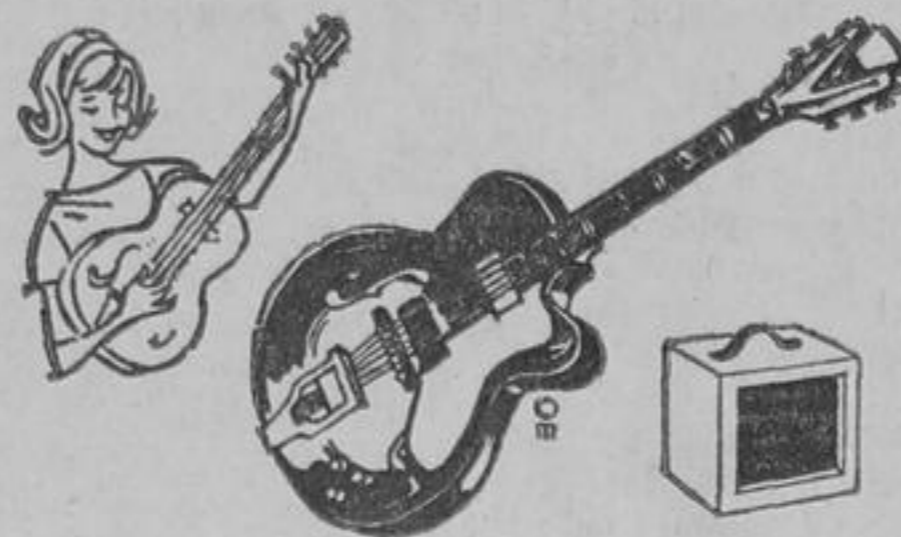

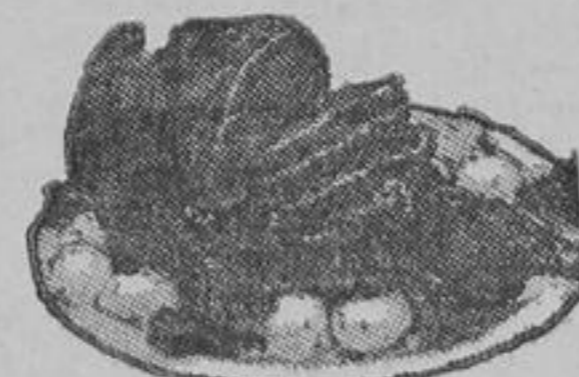
