Positive Action Needed At Lake Wilcox

Positive action should be taken by the Provincial Government to improve conditions around Lake Wilcox, newly-elected Councillor James Smith told Whitchurch Township Council last week. He claims that many cottages in the resort community should be torn down and the district completely redeveloped.

Mr. Smith charges that owners of houses were quite anxious to obtain tenants who are on welfare since then they are usually assured of their rent pay-

Acting Welfare Officer P.C. Douglas Murray reported he had attempted to find employment for male memhers of families on welfare, but found many unwilling to accept these jobs. He said their names were consequently removed from the welfare rolls but the family still required support. He also claimed that in some instances relief monies were spent on items other than household necessities.

The constable reported 1964 welfare payments were down \$1,200 from the previous year, and the relief total for January 1965 was down by \$600.


