ch, grade 8 students are asked to make a tentative choice of the programs and branches in which they will enrol by February 17, the superintendent reported. He pointed out however, that it is understood that this choice is not irrevocable. It is hoped a large number of students will not change their choices before the final registration in April.

In order to familiarize grade 8 students with courses available in the arts and science and business and commerce branches of secondary schools, grade 8 classes from the entire township spent a half day at Langstaff Secondary School during the first two weeks of February.

After viewing the flag for a few moments students returned to their classrooms where teachers continued the flag subject by explaining that as our country's symbol, the flag will get only as much respect as we, through our actions, bring it. Mr. McRoberts said that regardless of what feelings may have been up until now, he felt that many minds would be changed once people see the new banner flying.
