Public School Board Stands Firm On Question Of Lunches

Despite the personal plea of the father of a seven-year-old pupil at MacKillop School, Richmond Hill Public School Board last Thursday stood firm in its resolution to keep the youth from eating his lunch at school.

Two weeks ago the board ruled that it could not make any exceptions in the case of the seven-year-old, as long as he lived within a 34 mile radius, the boundary prescribed by the board as the maximum distance at which a student must travel before he is granted asylum at school at lunch time.

However, the board did leave one possibility open to the youth, who several times has been sent home from school because of his insistence in bringing his lunch.

After hearing the father's remarks on behalf of his son, the board said that presentation of a medical certificate would be sufficient to allow him to bring his lunch for an extended period.

In his presentation, the father said he worked in Aurora and was unable to be at home during the day.

Protest Propane Tanks In Area

(Continued from Page 1) This plant will not continue to increase its storage capacity?" was the third question asked.

Former Planning Director Harold Deeks was quoted as saying in 1962 that the plant was then considered a non-conforming use under the new or any future zoning bylaw, and as such it could remain there indefinitely as long as it was not changed, enlarged or extended.

Mayor Broadhurst stated Mr. Deeks was voicing a personal opinion at that time—but pointed out that the use never was and still is not a non-conforming one.

The fourth question asked was "In the event of an accident, what protection would be afforded to residents in the area regarding insurance or compensation?" The mayor stated he did not think there would be any legal liability on the municipality.

He asked Lionel West, of the Energy and Resources Commission, who was present, what insurance such a plant was required to carry. Mr. West was not able to answer this, as these requirements come under the Department of Labour.

It was decided to ask Mr. Alley to provide this information next Monday evening.

The letter concluded with a request that, until this matter is settled to the satisfaction of all parties concerned, a 24-hour watch be put on the plant for the safety of nearby residents.

Mrs. Paxton reported it was understood that the main danger from the plant was that a night watchman should be employed by the plant itself. "It's left unguarded all through the night," she claimed.

Mayor Broadhurst suggested that council suggest to planning board that provision be made to prevent another bulk propane storage plant being established in town.

Councillor Walter Scudds asked "How safe is propane? That's an awfully big tank with a lot of propane in it."

Mr. West stated: "There isn't anything that anyone can guarantee safe. If we are speaking of absolute safety, then it is unsafe. From a relative, which is our (energy and resources) point of view, we can only

R.H. Police Committee Looks At Ambulance, Fire, Police Needs

Ambulance requisites will be discussed at a meeting to be arranged by the town clerk with Vaughan Township Council, Richmond Hill Council decided Monday night when it accepted and implemented recommendations of its police committee.

The ambulance operator will present a 1964 financial statement to the police committee of ambulance expenses, to be audited by town auditors.

Other recommendations which were implemented were: That specifications for a new pumper for the fire department be drawn up.

That one man from the fire department be sent to the Ontario Fire College at Gravenhurst for one week at a cost of \$75 plus expenses.

Agriculture Representative W. A. Wall recommends the annual meeting of the Beef Improvement Association which starts on Thursday and combines with the meeting of the Ontario Cattle Breeders' Association on Friday at the Royal York Hotel to commercial livestock men in the County of York.

Mr. Wall reports that next week is filled right up to top. Monday and Tuesday will see the annual meeting of the Ontario Plowmen's Association.

Next week is also farmers' week at the OAC in Guelph, Mr. Wall notes. Staff members of various departments of the college will discuss for farmers the most recent changes in farm practices.

He also reports that seed corn should be given attention now. Early maturing varieties are very important and are the first to run short in dealers' stocks.
