of specialist would it require to carry out such inspections?" Mr. Wilde replied that his department's inspections are done by three men who have a minimum of 15 years experience in propane. He recommended sending a man to the fire college where his department lectures on propane gas.

Fire Chief Alfred Stong reported he had attended these lectures, but found in practice that a man would almost have to be an engineer to conduct such inspections intelligently in respect to the pressure vessels, lines, safety valves, etc. "I look for leaks when I inspect," the chief stated. "However I believe the plant is well controlled by inspections from the Departments of Energy and Resources and Labour, the insurance companies and myself."

Asked by Councillor Eric Handbury as to maximum precautions, Mr. Wilde reported his department required that the product be contained, that no source of ignition be present or nearby, that no incinerating be permitted in the area and that vehicles not be brought too close to the tanks or parked there. Repeating to the mayor's question as to the relative danger of propane compared to natural gas or gasoline, Mr. Wilde replied that dependent on circumstances gasoline storage tanks at service stations would be much more dangerous. "The explosive properties of propane have been impressed on us by the Maple explosion," the reeve commented.

A representative of Superior Propane denied emphatically a charge that there had been a small explosion at that company's new plant on Keele Street in the Township of Vaughan.

Council passed a resolution asking the committee of adjustment to revise its procedure to ensure that all persons within the radius of danger (a distance of 60 feet was suggested) be notified of applications for primary use of land or buildings for bulk storage of anything that is highly explosive or inflammable. This resolution was moved by Reeve Plaxton and seconded by Deputy-reeve Floyd Perkins.

On motion of Councillors William Lazenby and Lois Hanney, the Department of Municipal Affairs will be asked to amend the Planning Act so that the committee of adjustment will be required to handle hazardous use applications in the same manner and subject to the same conditions as required by minor variance applications to the committee of adjustment.

The planning board was also asked to come up with an amendment to By-law 1000 which will prevent further bulk storage of flammable or explosive materials establishing in the municipality.

### 460 Secondary School Teachers Attend OSSTF Development Day

Approximately 460 high school teachers, including staff members of all York Central District High Schools, representatives from the Village of Markham, Stouffville, Bradford, Aurora and King City high schools, attended the professional development day arranged by District 31 of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation at Sutton High School February 19.

Master of ceremonies for the day-long session was W. J. Burgess, head of the guidance

department at Langstaff Secondary School. Mr. Burgess was also chairman of the professional development committee which organized the program for the day.

At the morning session, guest speaker was D. F. Dadson, Dean of the Ontario College of Education. Mr. Dadson spoke on aspects of teacher training, replying to criticism of OCE which had appeared in a recent bulletin of the OSSTF. Discussion and a lively question period followed.

The teachers were given an opportunity to inspect textbooks displayed by the Canadian Book Publishers Council as well as displays of scientific and audiovisual equipment.

During the afternoon the teachers took part in their choice of 19 group sessions on various subjects where they heard speakers, took part in panel discussions or saw demonstrations. The groups varied in size from an art group of only three to a group of English teachers numbering 58.

After the close of the program, the 34 teachers from Langstaff Secondary were invited to tea at the Sutton home of Miss Margaret Anderson, head of the commercial department.

### Charge Of Conspiracy Dismissed "Victim Of Sucker Plot" — Butler

A charge of conspiracy against a Rexdale man was dismissed last week in magistrate's court when Magistrate James Butler decided he had been the victim of a "sucker" plot.

John Krause, who gave his address as Kingston Penitentiary, told the court that he and a companion, Ellis Lazar, who was also brought up from Kingston to testify, had been given two guns by Michael Ocsai, when they had met him in Woodbridge, November 28. He said that Ocsai had told them of a liquor store that they could rob and gave them the guns to carry it out.

Krause said he and Lazar had planned to sell the guns, and had only pretended to go along with the accused.

Ocsai, who is a member of a gun club, said he had been on his way to the club when he met the two witnesses. He said he had had the guns in a box in his car.

were missing later on, he went up to the hotel where Lazar was staying and had asked him about them. Lazar denied having them, he said.

Ocsai then reported the loss to police, who picked up Krause the next day with the two guns in his car. Magistrate Butler said he thought it was strange that the accused would go to the police to report the loss of his guns, if he had anything to hide, knowing there would be a complete investigation.

He said he felt the two witnesses had probably thought they had a "sucker" on their hands and had made up the story when they had been caught with the guns.
