### All Lake Fishing Huts Must Be Registered

Less than half the fish huts presently in use on Lake Simcoe and Couchiching have had registration numbers affixed, the Department of Lands and rorests report.

Because of complaints from property owners around the lakes of debris and rotting garbage washed up on the beaches in the spring from abandoned huts, this year a regulation that all huts must be registered was put into effect. The regulation also states that all such huts must have the registration number affixed in letters not less than 21/2 inches high. Good opportunities have been provided for hut owners to obtain their numbers and they are still available at Sibbald Point Provincial Park, Bass Lake Provincial Park, the department headquarters at Angus and the district forester's office at Maple.

So far this season conservation officers have been lenient because this is a new regulation, but no excuse will be accepted after the end of February if the registration numbers have not been secured and placed on the huts.






