The only way now that Christianity can advance in these countries is by sending Christian teachers, doctors, administrators agriculturists etc. and by their actually living their religion to demonstrate a point.

The film entitled "On That Friday" put out by the Women's Interchurch Council was then shown in connection with the coming World Day of Prayer. This showed women not only from different walks of life but from different lands setting one particular day of the year aside to pray together.

## Keele Scene Of Two Accidents

Keele Street was the scene of two accidents in Vaughan Township last week.

The first occurred February 18 about 11:10 a.m., near Richmond Street, and involved cars driven by Kurt Gamaski, 31, of Don Mills, and Elmer Bryson, 76, lot 33, concession 7, Vaughan Township.

According to police, the Gamaski car was parked off the road and was struck by the Bryson vehicle, which was attempting to make a u-turn at the time.

Damage to the two cars was estimated at \$90.

About \$200 damage was done to two cars in an accident near No. 7, February 19, about 4:50 p.m.

Police said that a car driven by Robert Ratcliffe, 41, of Agincourt, struck the left front fender of a vehicle driven by John A. Males, 35, of Toronto, in attempting to pass him.

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
