New Fire Hall, School Four Teenagers Fined In Court

Bd. Office In Vaughan For Drinking While Under Age

Vaughan Township School Board is to be asked to sign a five year lease for that part of Vaughan Township municipal offices which it occupies or vacate the premises by March 15.

It was reported at the February 15 meeting of council that a study of allocation of office space in the building indicates that additional accommodation will have to be found either for the existing and additional township administrative staff or for the school board.

It was agreed therefore, to ask the school board to accept a five year lease "at a realistic rent plus remuneration for miscellaneous services supplied by the township" or to find other accommodation.

It was mentioned that the school board is considering renovation of the annex of the George Bailey School in Maple for its administrative offices. It was recommended that temporary accommodation be provided for the school board in the committee room of the municipal building pending renovation of the school property.

Gas Siphoning Brings Fines To Township Youths

Two youths who attempted to get some gas before the filling station opened, were each fined \$50 and costs when they appeared in magistrate's court last week.

Convicted of attempted theft were Fred McKenney, 17, of Ringwood, and Raymond Hathaway, 18, of RR 2, Markham.

Constable Douglas Tribbling, Markham Township Police, testified that he had picked up the two accused on suspicion after he had seen two people running away from a service station in Ringwood about 3.30 a.m., December 24.

A hose and two plastic containers were found lying beside a truck at the station.

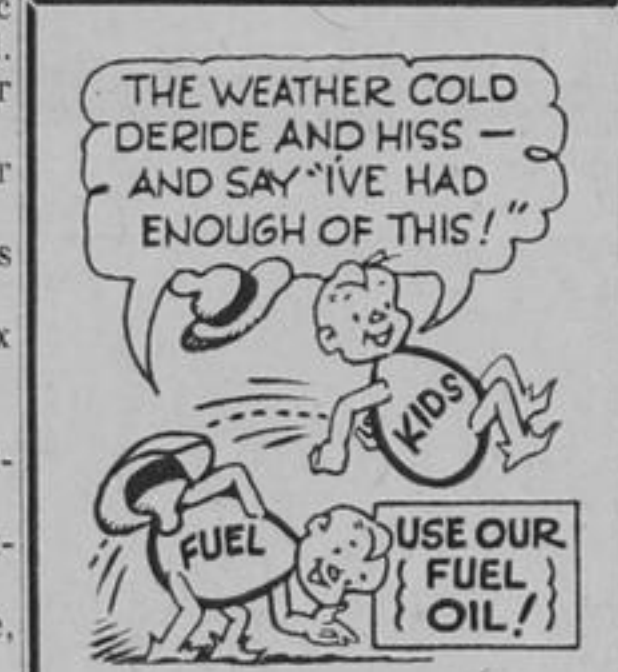
In his defense, McKenney said he had planned to take some gas from the car, but only because all the service stations were closed. He said he knew the owner and intended to pay him for the gas the next day.

He said the siphoning equipment was used by his father, who was in the automobile business, to transfer gas from one car to another around his premises.

In speaking to sentence, defence counsel Paul Manguy, said that while the two were guilty of a criminal offence, it hadn't been as black as it appeared.

Magistrate James Butler referred to the two as a "pair of stupid young men."

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The fire and police committee report showed that council had been approached by the CNR enquiring if any consideration had been given to the establishment of a fire hall in the area of the marshalling yard. The CNR was advised that council was considering locating a fire hall in the Keele Street and Highway 7 area.

This brought some objection from one member of the audience who felt that since the CNR was supported by federal funds, to which he was already contributing tax money, he shouldn't be further taxed to provide them with fire protection.

It was pointed out however that the CNR is a taxpayer in Vaughan Township (Clerk J. M. McDonald indicated they would pay between 70 and 80 thousand dollars in municipal taxes this year) and as such, were entitled to fire protection.

It was noted that the several industries already located in the area would require fire protection and this would also be a selling point for the sale of more industrial lots.

The road committee reported a total of \$574,463 spent on roads, culverts and bridges last year and a resolution was passed to petition the Department of Highways for their grant on this amount.

Road maintenance cost \$159,584 and of this amount, \$21,343 was spent for control of snow and ice and \$61,226 for dust control.

The road committee also recommended the passing of a by-law naming Concession 7, from Steeles Avenue to the north limit of lot 13 and from Sherwood Sideroad to the north town line, Fenmar Drive. They had been advised that North York plans to extend their street of this name northerly to join up with Concession 7.

Council passed a by-law permitting the appointment of two men to the building department in the capacity of plan examiners. These were R. Harrington who has had eight years' experience with the Department of Highways and F. J. Bosman, a recent graduate in civil engineering from the Ryerson Institute of Technology. Both appointments were for a probationary period of six months.

Four teenagers, who claimed they didn't know where the beer had come from when they were picked up on drinking charges, January 17, were all fined under the Liquor Control Act, last week in magistrate's court.

Fined for drinking under age were: James Wessels, 16, of 69 Carrville Road, \$40 and costs; Michael Flannigan, 19, of 122 Roseview Avenue, \$45 and costs; Lorne Long, 19, of 153 Yonge Street North, \$35 and costs; Lynn Carter, 16, of RR 2, Maple, \$35 and costs.

The four were arrested in a car on Yonge Street in Richmond Hill by Constable Robert Deighton, who testified that they had all been drinking, and that one of them was drunk at the time.

The quartet had been to a dance at Newmarket but denied drinking, or any knowledge of the beer in the car.

Richard T. Moscrop, 17, of Summit View, Box 2, Richmond Hill, was given a suspended sentence and placed on probation for a year when he was convicted of a charge of malicious damage.

Constable Edward Green, Richmond Hill, testified that Moscrop had put his fist through the glass panelling in the door of a restaurant on Yonge Street, December 19, after he had become angry at not being able

to get into the washroom immediately.

Moscrop has a previous conviction for a similar offence. David Porter, attendance officer for York Central District High School Board, spoke on his behalf and asked for a lenient sentence, with possible probation.

Magistrate James Butler said that "over-indulgent parents" were the cause of such youths getting into trouble.

"Your father should be here, not you," he said.

By the terms of his probation, Moscrop must be in by 11 each night, and 12.30 on Saturdays, and must stay away from any known criminals, or gangs.

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
