Grants Not Affected February Snow Storms Cut School Attendance In Vaughan Township

Winter storms during the month of February cut drastically into the attendance at public schools in the Township of Vaughan, Superintendent J. R. MacDonald told Vaughan Township School Area Board Tuesday evening of last week. On February 10, 25 and 26 buses serving the schools were unable to operate resulting in a large number of pupils being absent from classes.

On February 10, 73 1/2% pupils days were lost; on February 25, 45% and on February 26, 53% because the buses could not serve their routes. The half days are accounted for by a kindergarten child who would attend school for half a day only.

These absences will not affect the Department of Education grant, Mr. MacDonald reported, since the department has approved marking these

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TSA 1 Teacher To Work On Science Course

The board of TSA 1 Markham agreed at its March 10 meeting to participate in the experimental science course under development by the Ontario Curriculum Institute.

A letter from the Institute invited the board's participation and asked them to nominate a teacher to take part in a three or four week course next July, observing and teaching a class in the new science course in Toronto.

The board named Gary Fraser a grade 8 teacher at Woodland School to participate. The board will also be required to provide science equipment costing up to \$1,000 but this will be used in the area schools afterwards. Mr. Fraser will be teaching science to grades 7 and 8 in the board's senior public school scheduled to open next fall.

Trustee Brian Leonard, chairman of the education committee reported that the first of the series of occupational lectures for grade 8 students had been held March 4.

Keynote speaker for the day was Markham Township Engineer Dusan Miklas who explained to the students various aspects of the engineering profession.

The children then split into smaller groups which were headed by architect D. Jackson, Robert Templeton, technical director at Thornhill Secondary School, G. Learn, principal of Henderson Avenue School and R. M. Monzon, assistant zone forester at the Department of Lands and Forests, Maple.

The next lecture in the series will be held at Woodland School when James H. Timmins, Thornhill solicitor, will head a group of speakers on occupations in the business world.

It was announced that winners in the area finals of the public speaking contest were Glen Smith of Bayview Glen School,

These three represented TSA 2 in the township finals held at the municipal offices, Buttonville March 1, when Frances Bishop was declared winner.

Trustees were assigned to attend various workshops at the convention. Guest speaker will be the newly-appointed superintendent of both elementary and secondary schools in Ontario, A. H. McKague.

A report of the health, safety and recreation committee noted that the hockey tournament was to be held at Unionville March 16.

A note was read from Henderson Avenue Home and School Association, reminding trustees of their part in the "Meet the school board" meeting to be held at Henderson Avenue School March 22.

A motion was passed permitting a collection to be taken up in area schools for the Junior Red Cross.

It was also reported that more children are now coming to school with proper physical education dress, following the sending home of a letter by the physical education director. Children are required to wear shorts and running shoes for their physical education periods.

Supervising Principal E. F. Sand reported to the board on the "scope and sequence" charts which the schools have been working on. He had one of these on display in the board office on which the social study course was laid out, showing material to be covered each month in grades 1 to 8.

The charts will prevent overlapping of material and help to bring about progressive learning with simple information about any given topic provided in early grades but the same topic gone into more thoroughly and intensively in later grades.

Enrolment in area schools remained stationary at 1,470 for January and February. Average daily attendance in February was 92.2%.

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
