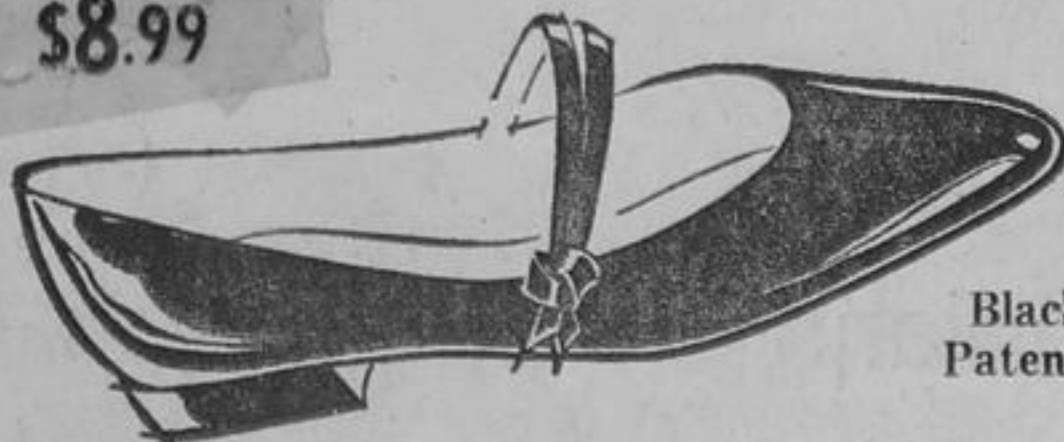

### Prizes Offered For Farm Improvement

York County farmsteads should take on a spruce and furnished look this summer as farmers vie for substantial cash prizes offered by York County Federation of Agriculture and York County Plowmen's Association. The contest is aimed to get the fertile farmlands of York County looking their best for the visitors who will be flocking to this area in the fall to attend the International Plowing Match.

Competitors will submit photographs of before and after scenes to the judges and the photographs of winning entries will be on display at the 1965 International Plowing Match. Literature has been mailed to all farmers in the county with some suggestions of what work should be undertaken to improve the appearance of farms. Of a total of 300 points 50 will be awarded for the general appearance on entering the farm. Condition of fences, laneway and overall effect will be deciding factors. Work on the home may bring 125 points and general clean-up, repairs, painting and planting will be considered. Another 125 points are allotted for barn and other outbuildings. Here too general clean-up and tidying up can bring points. Tearing down useless buildings, removal of useless machinery and junk, repairs, painting and planting will be given consideration by the judges in reaching their decisions.

The committee in charge of this competition is chaired by Oliver Bales of Sharon and includes James Darlington of Maple, James Faris of RRI Newmarket, and Fred Wicks, RRI Stouffville, secretary.

Under the direction of Supervisor of Physical Education, Frank Quigg physical education nights were held in the town separate schools, St. Joseph's Our Lady Help of Christians, Our Lady of Fatima and

St. Mary Immaculate, during Education Week. All of the children in each school, from kindergarten to grade eight, took part in the demonstrations. Preceding each program Mr. Quigg outlined the basic aims

of physical education, concluding it should be fun with a purpose. It was evident from the many rounds of applause that the parents enjoyed each demonstration.

The new trends in physical education — indirect teaching and creativity both allowing the child to think for himself—were much in evidence throughout each program.

With the addition of a trained supervisor, the local separate schools have taken a giant step

forward in this very important field. Plans for the spring include a Red Cross water safety program and a track and field meet.

### Fine Richmond Hill Man \$50 Wilful Damage At Drive-In Restaurant

A Richmond Hill man, who blamed it all on a faulty cigarette machine, was fined \$50 and costs Tuesday in magistrate's court when he was convicted on a charge of wilful damage. The charge arose out of an incident at Harvey's Drive-In Restaurant, Richvale, February 19, in which Norman C. Sutcliffe, of 138 Rumble Avenue, knocked out two spotlights at the rear of the restaurant with his fists. Sutcliffe told the court he had broken the lights in retaliation for being pushed around and hit on the arm by Lambert Van Dyke, the restaurant manager. He said he had tried to get some cigarettes from a machine in the restaurant, but had lost his money in the attempt. One of the clerks had then put in the required amount and had got a package. When Sutcliffe claimed the cigarettes as his own, he was set upon by the owner, who called him a liar, the accused said. Mr. Van Dyke then chased him to the back and struck him on the arm with a "billie," or a lead pipe, Sutcliffe said. Ronald King, 298 Brownvale Crescent, who was with the accused on the night in question, confirmed his evidence. Mr. Van Dyke denied hitting Sutcliffe at any time. Constable Alvin Kidd, Bond Lake OPP, said he had witnessed the accused breaking the lights behind the restaurant. He said he was not aware of what had gone on before, but that the accused had been drinking. Sutcliffe was also ordered to make restitution for the lights in the amount of \$6.
