

## Atomic Energy Expert Speaks To Yor' Central Secondary Students

On Wednesday of last week, Dr. R. H. Tomlinson of McMaster University, spoke to the grade 12 chemistry students at Bayview Secondary School on the topic of nuclear fission.

Using several analogies involving bouncing tennis balls, billiard balls and the probable effects if the moon were suddenly to fall to earth, Dr. Tomlinson explained the role of the neutron as it collides with a uranium 235 nucleus, causing oscillations which distort the shape of the nucleus, thus enabling the mutually repulsive forces of the nuclear protons to rupture the nucleus into two fragments (the fission action), with the release of more neutrons and vast amounts of energy.

The York North Chapter placed eighth out of 14 of Ontario's top choruses at the festival.

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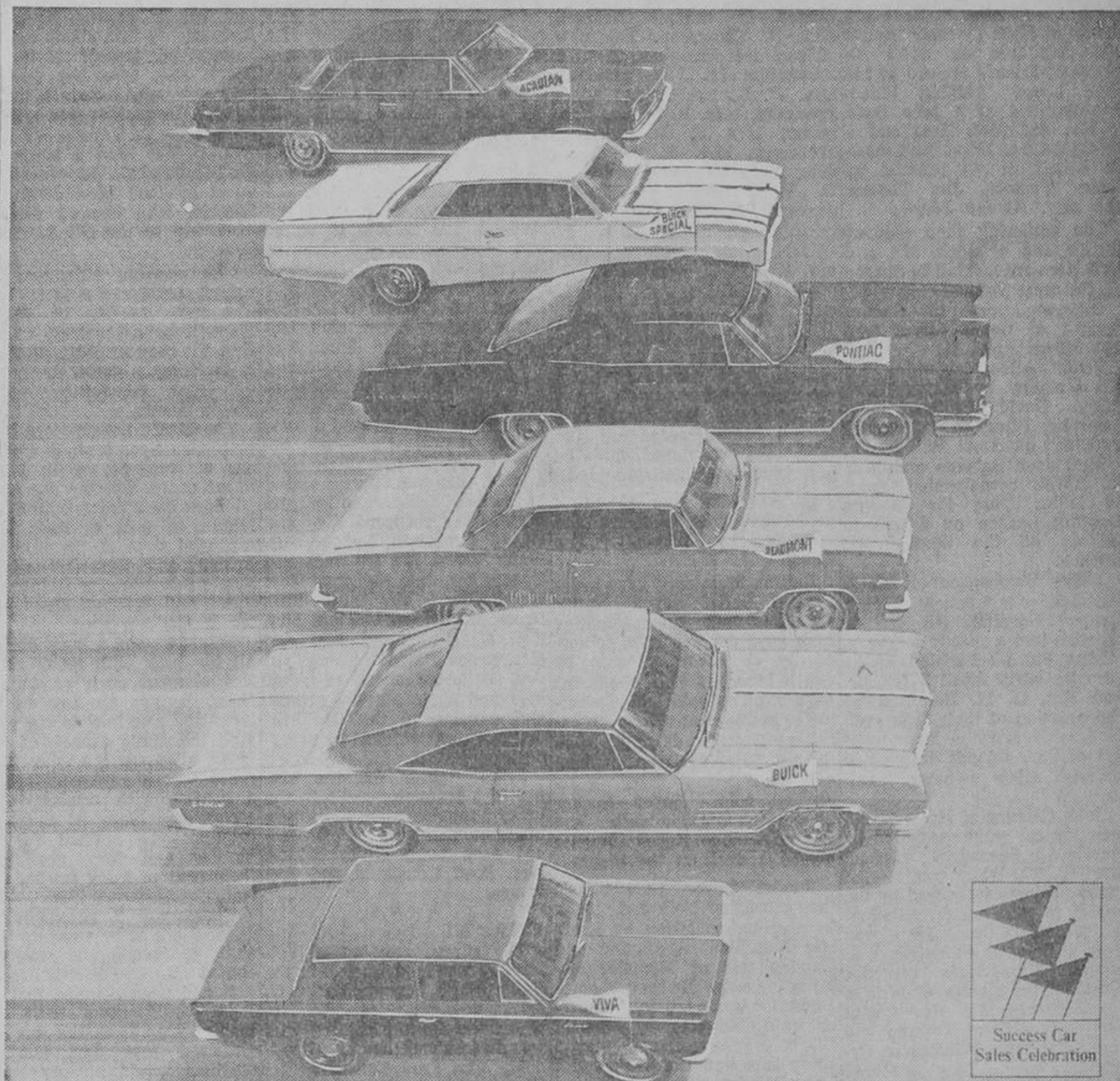


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
