Provincial Parks Fees Increased

Increases in entrance and camping permit fees in provincial parks this season have been announced by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests.

A camping permit will cost \$1.50 per day or \$9 per week. Length of stay in any one park will be limited to 28 days. Daily vehicle entrance permit will be \$1 with \$5 per year, allowing entry to any provincial park.

Nature Notes

(By Richmond Hill Naturalists)

During the past week the bursting of vibrant life from the dormancy of winter has at last started. Sap is running plentifully and the maple sugar bush is a busy place. Note how the buds on the trees are expanding and if you use a magnifying glass and examine the buds every few days you will have an interesting time watching the brown scaly coverings gradually being shed.

Some of the insects have emerged and these can be seen any sunny afternoon even though the night temperatures have been below freezing. There are several flocks of cedar waxwings around town. It is worth a pause to take time to watch these acrobats dart out from the trees and catch flies on-the-wing. It is even more spectacular when several choose a swaying clothes-line as their perch.

On March 28 the temperature was below zero when an eastern phoebe was first observed at the Maple Research Station. It hadn't taken it long to discover an available food supply. At 7 am it was seen gorging itself on the half-dormant flies clinging to the walls of one of the buildings. This was once that the work of man was a help rather than a hindrance to our wildlife.

Have you looked for an early spring flower yet? If you leave out dandelions, chickweed and the hardy weeds, skunk cabbage should be the first plant you will discover. It is often found blooming before the snow is off the ground. It isn't abundant in this area but it can be located in a sunny, mucky protected place. Its pointed helmet-like spathe, coloured and mottled with dark red, yellowish green and brown is a most attractive object not only to see but to photograph. A faint skunk odour can be detected and this is even more apparent, later in the spring, when the flowers have matured into fleshy fruits and the pale green oval-shaped leaves have

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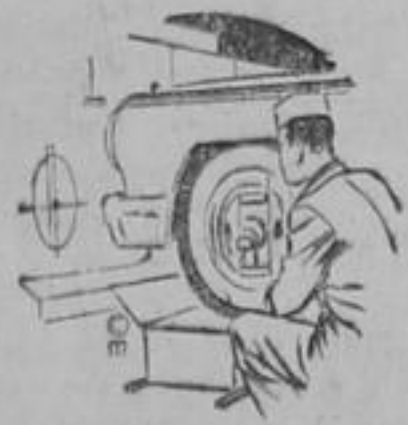

Woodbridge Has Hydro 50 Years

Woodbridge Hydro Commission will celebrate its 50th year of operation April 22 with an anniversary dinner. Guest speaker will be Ontario Hydro Chairman W. Ross Strike QC.

The first village Hydro Commission took office in January, 1915 and consisted of Chairman Joseph J. Watson, Commissioners N. George Wallace and C. Leon Wallace and Secretary-Treasurer Edwin Brown.

The initial agreement with the hydro was signed by the village council in July, 1914. Temporary service was provided the night before the annual Woodbridge fair in October of that year, but permanent service was not available until December.

Records show that with 651 people living in Woodbridge in 1915, the new hydro commission had 77 customers, 42 domestic, 33 commercial and two power customers.

In their 50th year of operation, with a population of 2,481 individuals in the village, there are 793 customers, 731 domestic, 50 commercial and 12 power customers.

The average monthly power load has increased a hundredfold, from 18 kilowatts in 1915 to 1,800 in 1965. Present commission is made up of Chairman A. W. Hollingshead, Commissioners Clarence Graham and Reeve Norm Garlock, and Secretary - treasurer W. H. Young.
